## Here and There.

Capt. Bull, of the whaler Cabot, had a finger of the right hand severely hurt some time ago. It is since very sore and may possibly have to be amputated.

The Crustacean, James Baird's launch which had been engaged in the fishery collecting business in Placentia Bay for several months past, returned on Saturday. She will lay up for the winter as nearly all the fish in the Bay has been shipped either here or to the foreign markets.

The S. S. Caouana will sail this afternoon for Montreal, and will make another run back to this port via Gulf centres as there are large quantities of freight in Montreal awaiting shipment to St. John's. The Rosalind and Bonavista cannot handle it all, and so it was determined to send the Caouana once more.

The whaler Cabot, which is now here, while at Snook's Arm killed a hump and 26 fin back whales. While working at Balena she captured 3 hump backs, 8 fins and 21 sulphur bottoms, and her total catch is 59 fish. This is below the catch of last year when she took 76 fish, but the number of sulphurs taken and the general good quality of the fish will even up the voyage in the yield of oil.

We learn by the Portia that there is an abundance of herring at Bonne Bay, and when the ship was there a few days ago three American vessels were there loaded, one of them being Capt. Bonia's vessel. The herring taken there are of very large size and the Americans are paying \$1.25 per barrel for them, the standard price. The fishermen hope to sell large quantities to the Americans and to make good money while the voyage lasts.

She had grand weather from that down the coast, especially on Sunday and Sunday night.

## Fish Stopped Steamer

The Durango, bound to Halifax, detained in Mid-Ocean by a School of Fish.

The Furness Line steamer Durango, Capt. Chambers, which arrived in port Saturday afternoon from Liverpool with a general cargo, was detained and obliged to be stopped in mid-ocean by a big school of fish. The officers and others on board were not aware that they had run through the school until the ship's speed began to slacken, and it appeared as if something was amiss with the machinery. Orders were given to stop the ship and ascertain the trouble with the circulating pumps, which were not acting properly and were interfering materially with the speed of the steamer. When the ship was stopped, an examination showed that the valve of the circulating pump was completely choked by small fish, measuring about six inches in length. The valve being choked prevented the circulating pump from doing its work. The valve and pump were cleared and the ship proceeded on its way to Halifax. Capt. Chambers, when seen by the Recorder this morning, stated that he had preserved a dozen of the fish with the intention of ascertaining their species. They are different from any ever seen before by the captain. He says he never knew of a previous occurrence of this nature.—Halifax Recorder, Oct. 31.

## To-Day's News.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-day. Sir William White, the former Chief Architect of the British Navy, interviewed here, said:—"The Imperial Navy must be one in type and training, so that the different parts can all work together. Everything must be secondary to that. We want an Imperial Navy, where so far we have had a Royal Navy, for which Great Britain paid." Sir William said also:—"This building of Canada's Navy in Canada will have an important influence in the re-creation of the ship-building industry on the coast of the Dominion. One big question in regard to navy matters is, of course, whether the Canadian Navy would go to war, if the mother country did so. A coalition has never proved so strong as a homogeneous union. The battle of Trafalgar showed that the agreement outlined at the Imperial Conference was one to fit the case I think."

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The King's last week before embarking with the Queen for India, will be spent at Buckingham Palace, with two days' shooting at Windsor. The Sailor King does not consider it dignified to josh the ship at Marseilles or Genoa, to avoid the risks of a stormy passage through the Bay of Biscay. He will start from Portsmouth, under the escort of two powerful squadrons as far as Spithead. Four armoured cruisers accompany the King, through the fall voyage. The Corporation Durbar is the King's own idea. He has been bent on carrying it out with the wealth of naval spectacle and sumptuous splendour, so that the Imperial character of the Royal Progress from London to Delhi may be emphasized. When the Durbar was planned, precautions against a political crisis at home were considered necessary. These risks apparently passed with the enactment of the Parliament Bill, and the period of storm and stress have been deferred for 10 to 12 months.

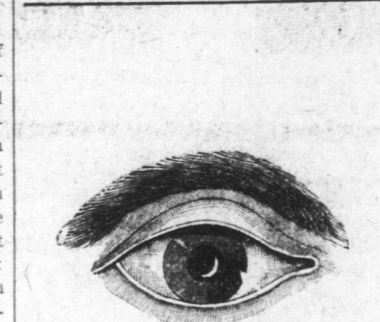

## Revolutionists Grow Stronger

Special to Evening Telegram. SHANGHAI, To-day. The most interesting development yesterday was the completion of the organization of the local cabinet by the revolutionists. Wu Tingfang, who formerly had the post of minister head of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The appointments are not taken seriously, the appointees lacking knowledge of the action of the revolutionists, except in the case of the Civil Administrator, who has been acting in that official's capacity throughout. Wu Tingfang, while declining to acknowledge any participation in the revolutionary administration at Shanghai, openly sympathizes with it, although he criticizes some of its methods. He opposed the Manchu clique at Peking. Shanghai in the province of Che Kiang, famous for its mines, Quipsan and Kashing of the same province, have peacefully surrendered to the rebels and order is being maintained. With the extension of the railroad from Shanghai to Chih Kiang are now in the hands of the revolutionists. Nanking is still outwardly loyal and quiet, but the Tartar general is so unpopular that an upheaval threatens.

## Has Peking Fallen?

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The Reuter Telegram Company's latest despatch from Peking, received yesterday makes no mention of the fall of the city. Lengthy despatches sent from Peking timed early to the Daily Mail mention the fall of the capital and the flight of the Court.

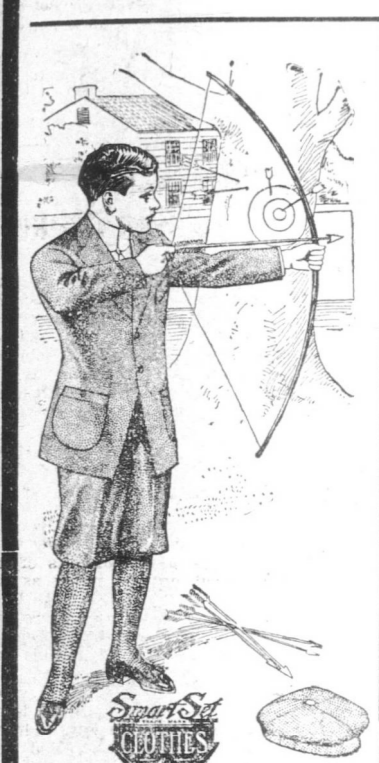
