

Produce and Provisions.

From Saturday's Trade Review.

Fish—Exports for the week from St. John's and the outports have been the lowest for some time, due to the fact that practically all stocks of fish have been cleaned up. Exports for the next few weeks will be confined mainly to fish intended for the market with 4,732 quintals shipped by the St. John's Fish Co., and the Little Fish Co. cleared for Bahia with 3,312 quintals from Bowring Bros. The Al. F. Rose is loading at St. Breton from Hickman and Co's, for Oporto. In addition to these a few small shipments were sent out by steamer. The St. John's market still holds its own and there are greatly reduced with further arrivals. Conditions for fish were never better but exporters are not optimistic on account of exchange rates and the high import duties imposed by the Portuguese Government.

Old Oil—Latest advices from the American market give a much more hopeful tone to the outlook for this article. Recent quotations have not been in keeping with the demand in the United States where \$110.00 is being offered for some buyers. This figure is offered for oil here during the past week, but little could be got for the price. A considerable change in the price has taken place in the oil industry as a result of the settlement of labor disputes that had been clipping the industry for some time, and the return to work of thousands of operatives who have been out of work for months. The outlook for new oil is much brighter. The week's exports amounted to 15,000 gallons.

Flour—The market is very erratic, the general tendency is firmer, prices having advanced about 20 cents this week. This advance, it is believed, has been occasioned by disappointing threshing results from the United States winter wheat belt. It is not, however, being reflected in quotations which are \$9.70 for standard brands and \$9.20 to \$9.50 for other qualities. There is little buying activity and imports have been nominal for some weeks. The crop outlook is extremely bright for the Western Canadian provinces. Heavy rains during the week came at a critical moment and the greatest gloom now prevails amongst business and agricultural interests.

Work—There is absolutely no change in the pork market since last report. The present tendency is, however, firmer but there is little or no buying. Local demand is now at its lowest. The 500 barrels arrived to dealers during the week and prices remain unchanged at \$29.00 for Fat Back, \$30.00 for Ham and \$39.00 for Grocers' Family Mess.

Wool—The market is still weak with signs of any further tendency for the time to come. New York firms are actually selling from \$2.00 to \$5.00 below cost of production. There is little local buying and the market is fairly stocked. Fourteen hundred bales by the Rosalind constituted the week's imports.

Classes—The Barbados market is to be about closed with both sugar and Fancy molasses all sold. This season has been exceedingly few as compared with other years and as a consequence the market is only moderately supplied. One lot came in this week, the schooner L. Warren arriving on Wednesday with 475 puncheons, 75 tierces and half-barrels, which was consigned to several dealers. A cargo of two tons have arrived to outport dealers. A few others are expected shortly. Quotations all point to prices rising at the present level. Quotations for whole sale are 80 cents per gallon for Fancy and 70 to 75 cents for the other.

Wool—This market is somewhat firmer as a result of the reaction following the sharp rise of two weeks ago. During the past week prices declined on profit taking sales and buyers have been a little more active. This is not, however, reflected in quotations on the spot as prices have not been advanced in proportion to the advancing cost. Grange, both in barrels and sacks is quoted at \$11.10 per 100 lbs.

Wool—There is no change since the week in this market. Island wool is now selling at \$3.00 per bale and only sufficient stocks to meet local demand from week to week. On hand. Large shipments are expected next week and will hold at the new prevailing price. Crop outlook for both local and foreign is good and there is no great change in prices for this season's product.

Wool—Oats are somewhat stronger in the wholesale price here, remains at 30 per sack. There is very little buying as yet and imports are low. A few hundred sacks being sent in by the steamers arriving last week. Present stocks are not enough to meet the small demand but these will be augmented by Canadian Sapper. This article is even weaker in report. Local dealers are offering \$52.00 per ton, a figure likely to prevail for the balance of the summer. The market is at its lowest and little or no buying done. Latest crop indicate good prospects for a while local hay is also expected last year's crop.

A Terror to the Huns.

Major J. B. McCudden, whose death on July 9, 1918, was due to an accident, was famous for the number of his victories over German methods. He had come from Scotland, and was on his way to an aerodrome in France, after a safe landing from his overseas flight, when the accident which caused his death happened. He had had an astonishing record of successful flights. He crashed 45 enemy aircraft, and drove down 13. Some days he was invincible and his sense of mastery both as pilot and marksman led him to challenge any enemy at sight and to accept unequal odds. He

had a cool head and was most undisturbed when in greatest danger. He always succeeded in manoeuvring into the good position from which he could use his machine gun, and when he had secured that he was practically sure of his man. One day, when he was last out in France, he had a succession of single combats in which he was victorious, so that within an hour or so of his leaving the aerodrome, he had crashed five hostile aircraft, by shooting them with his machine gun, after close and exciting manoeuvres. In one case all four wings of the enemy's aeroplane dropped off, and in another case it fell in flames. This deadly precision of attack, generally from a height above the enemy, made

him feared on the western front by all hostile aces who could appreciate his way of fight and of fighting; but those whom he once met and engaged seldom lived to see him again. Major James R. McCudden, V.C., D.S.O., J.C., M.C., Croix de Guerre, was only 24 years of age. He was born in barracks at Chateaufort, his father being a warrant officer in the R.E. Major McCudden joined the R.F.C. as a mechanic.
