The Abyssinian Campaign. Insolvent Act of 1864.

The special correspondent of the Times witing from Upper Soorgo on the second inst, gives an account of a march through a mountain pass. He says:--We left Mulketto yesterday at three in the afternoon, and Koomaylee about six. This road, just finished by Mayor Baigriel, lay for the greater part of the journey over a dead level of sand, cov-ered for the first mile or two with salt-plants, and afterwards with accias. It was hard when first made, but was soon cut up by traffic, and is now very heavy for men and horses. Bags of rice and grain, here and there bore witness to the carelesaness of the baggage-men and honesty or apathy of the natives, who seemed, however, to have no villages or hebitations very near. Once or twice we came upon a spot where a handful in perfect preservation, and I am told that the proprietor can return to it, as he is always ready to move out of it, at a day's notice, " packing up"—that bugbear of civilised life-being vikh him a simple process. The ride offers no fine views, the mountain ranges in front of us—we were going due west—being obscured by haze not clouds of dust. There have bees farful dust-storms in the camp lately, that blinding and choking everybody, turning cups of tes into little pools of muddy water, salt into pepper, "officers and gentlemen" into grimy, disreputable-looking nondescripts whom their own mothers wouldn't recognize. Every one was glad enough to reach Koomaylee which is prettily situated in a hollow formed by the semicircular sweep of a low wountain range, and in which ther is no dust, and a fair supply of fresh wat-er. It was quite a treat to be able to wash in clear and fresh water; instead of the torackish muddy stuff which at Mul-ketto made the process of sooning a mere matter of form, to be observed simply out of deference ot tradition. This morn-ing we were up before daybreak, but could not start the baggage before is of ouch. A finger-post, in the bas Brit-both aff a mile, we reached the bed of the torret up which the pass winds to the orrectiv

At every turn of the road, which was often hidden altogether from our view at a few paces distant, we found oursolves, as it were inclosed prisoners in a fresh chain of precipitous cliffs.
