MONTREAL MARKET SHOWS WEAKNESS

Market Featured by a Small Dribbling Liquidation

Montreal, Oct. 9.—The reopening of the Canadian stock exchanges after the Thanksgiving holiday was accompanied by conditions in New York not radically different from those of last week.

A fairly steady but quiet tone in the early dealings in the larger market was succeeded by a somewhat pretty well all through the first buy there was no acute weakness, and the close while depressed, was not unsatisfactory under the circumstances.

In bonds, the chief activity continued to center in the war loans. The first was considerably more active than recently, transactions to a par value of \$4,300,000 were reported at 96 3/4, or unchanged from the previous day.

The third was also unchanged at 94 1/2 with dealings footing up \$39,000. Total business for the day was 2,975 shares, \$86,900 bonds, and 110 unlisted shares.

THE NATIONS IN SESSION: Paris, Oct. 9.—The council of the inter-parliamentary commercial conference of the allies began a
