LONDON, June 28 .- Mr. Henry M. Stan ley, who is the Unionist candidate for the ley, who is the Unionist candidate for the House of Commons in the northern division of Lambeth, attended a meeting held in that division to-day and addressed the electors from a cart. Mr. Stanley was accompanied by his wife. In his address Mr. Stanley, referring to the eight-hour law, said that if he had only worked eight hours a day he never would have been ahead of the Germans in Africa, and would never have added 200,000 square miles of land to British territory, while Dr. Peters, at the head of the German expedition, was running amuck and making treaties.
