In the Dining-Room.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 5.

BREAKFAST—Oranges. Graham
muffins with cream. Eggs brouille.
Doughnuts. Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Something for
luncheon. Fresh bread and but-
ter. Cream puffs. Preserved
peaches. Cocoa.

DINNER—Julienne soup. Crack-
ers. Baked whitefish. Mashed
potatoes. Turkey. Lettuce with
salad dressing. A new dessert.
Chocolate cake. Tea or coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them
in a scrapbook.

Eggs Brouille—Beat six eggs, half a
cupful of milk or cream, one-half tea-
spoonful of salt, and a sprinkling of
pepper together. Cut two mushrooms
into dice and fry for one minute in
two tablespoonfuls of butter. Four thin
slices of ham and two slices of butter
eggs over the mushrooms and stir over
the fire until the mixture thickens.
Take from fire and beat rapidly until
the eggs become thick and creamy.
Have slices of toast on hot dish. Heap
the mixture on toast and garnish with
parsley. Very nice.

Something for Luncheon—A good
dish for luncheon is made from cold
meat, either lamb or veal, chopped and
mixed with cold nuts, and in the pro-
portion of 28 nuts to a pint of meat.
Place nuts before using. Season this
with a dash of pepper and salt and
half a teaspoonful of oil and mix to-
gether with a beaten egg. Make into
small balls, put into a baking dish with
a half pint of strained tomato poured
around them and cook fifteen minutes.
Put the balls in a hot place, cook the
tomato until it thickens, season with a
saltspoonful of salt, a dash of pepper,
a tablespoonful of butter and serve
poured around the meat.

Cream Puffs—Boil one cup of water
and one-half cup butter together and
stir in one cup flour, stirring until
smooth. When cool add three eggs.
Beat well and drop on greased paper
and bake in rather hot oven 30 minutes.
When cool slit along one side
with a sharp knife and fill with a
cream made as follows: Beat two eggs
and two-thirds of a cup of sugar until
light and stir into one pint of boiling
milk. When thick remove from the
stove, cool and flavor with one-half
teaspoonful vanilla.

A New Dessert—Whip a pint of cream
to froth and color with a pale green
with vegetable coloring. Soak a fourth
of a box of gelatine in a quarter of a
cup of water until it dissolves. Stir
it in hot water until it dissolves. Stir
three ounces of powdered sugar into
the gelatine and mix thoroughly.
When the mixture begins to
thicken add one-half teaspoonful of
vanilla. Add half a cupful of blanched
almonds chopped very fine. Pour into
small glasses ready for serving, and
serve very cold.

Chocolate Cake—One cup of sugar,
one heaping tablespoonful of butter,
two eggs, one-third of a cup of milk,
two-thirds of a cup of chocolate and
one-fourth of a cup of boiling water,
turned on the chocolate, one and one-
half cups of flour, two teaspoonfuls
baking powder, one teaspoon vanilla.
Bake in three layers.

Filling—Two-thirds of a cup of milk
and two cups of sugar. Boil ten min-
utes, take from the stove and stir until
it creams.

Presented With a Handsome Silver-
Headed Umbrella by the Local

In Earnest.

Progress of the Movement to
Erect a Jubilee Hospital.

Good Meetings Held in South Lon-
don and Ward Four.

The Services of Prominent Citizens En-
listed in the Work.

At Knox Church the meeting of res-
idents of South London interested in
the new hospital was presided over
by Rev. J. G. Stuart. Dr. J. D. Wil-
son and Mr. W. H. Bartram outlined
the work of the jubilee committee,
and a discussion followed, in which
Messrs. J. D. Kilgour, Alexander, T.
Brenton, Thompson, Rev. Richard
Hobbs and Archdeacon Davis took
part. The concord of sympathy with
the movement augured well for its
success. All thought the hospital a
necessity, and the means of commem-
orating the jubilee year most fitting.

The work of organizing the ward
was referred to a committee com-
posed of the following representatives
from the four churches in the South
London: Messrs. Wall, D. Campbell, T.
Brenton and Hooker, Mesdames
White, Yarker and Weld, and Miss
Coford. Mrs. Yarker was appointed
convenor, and the committee given
power to add to their number to any
extent. They will appoint the ward
as they see fit, and make a sys-
tematic canvass.

The fact that unless the citizens
subscribe now, they will in the course
of a very short time be obliged to
pay for a new hospital through tax-
ation, was emphasized by Mr. Bar-
tram.

It was thought advisable to have
representatives of the ward attend the
meeting of the County Council in
June, when the matter of a grant to
the hospital will be definitely
decided, and Col. Leys and Dr. Piper
were chosen.

The ladies have taken a deep
interest in the scheme, and were evi-
dent from the large proportion they formed
of the audience. Rev. W. M. Walker
was unable to be present, but wrote
strongly approving the action of the
committee.

THE MEETING IN WARD FOUR.
A meeting of the citizens of No. 4
ward interested in the new hospital
project was held at the Collegiate In-
stitute last evening. Among the
prominent persons present were: Dr.
Niven (chairman of the ward), W. T.
Strong, Canon Dann, W. H. Morgan,
A. Hanson, Principal Merchant, Geo.
Cradock, H. C. Craig, Mrs. (Dr.)
Niven and Mrs. Geo. Cradock.

After an informal discussion of
various means of interesting the
citizens resident in the ward, Mr. W.
T. Strong suggested that the voters'
list be taken and several of the promi-
nent citizens in each block in the ward
be asked to look after the lists in their
neighborhoods.

Canon Dann went further and sug-
gested that a number of representative
men be asked to look over the ground.
The influential men should first be
asked for their subscriptions. It was
a mistake to prematurely circulate
lists in an indiscriminate manner, as
was being done in some cases.

It was then decided to ask the fol-
lowing gentlemen present in the ward
to meet at the Collegiate Institute on
Thursday evening to arrange for a
systematic canvass: E. J. McRobert,
W. T. Strong, Canon Dann, T. H.
Luscombe, John Bowman, W. R.
Hobbs, Dr. Hodgson, Walter Fair-
bairn, John Cameron, R. W. Pudli-
combe, Frank Love, J. M. Logan, R.
P. Matthews, Judge Elliot, Hume
Elliot, J. McMahon, T. G. McDowell,
Thomas G. Whiskard, James Garrett,
A. B. Cox, John Walker, Wm. Scar-
row, R. Gartner, T. D. Hodgson, Adam
Beck, J. R. Kettleworth, C. E. Han-
son, G. C. McCormick, Drs. Eccles, C.
T. Campbell, Niven, Ziegler, Meek,
James B. Campbell, and the clergymen
of the ward.

Considerable satisfaction was ex-
pressed at the probable handsome con-
tribution of the county. It was de-
cided to emphasize the fact that the
promises were not binding unless the
full \$60,000 was subscribed by June 30.
