The Ministers again debated their report, and came to the conclusion that no reason could be seen for the Sultan's fears. They again recommended compliance with the demands. Halil Rifat Pasha, Grand Vizier, sought an audience with the Sultan yesterday, with a view to persuading him to sanction the firmans, but he was not successful. It is generally believed that if the

All the crews were rescued from death by the gallant college boys of the Evanston life-saving crew, aided by the citizens of the suburb of Glencoe. Water was let into the holds of the vessels after they had struck the boulders to keep them from pounding to pieces. It is believed the Owen and Michigan may be saved, but the Nicholson may prove a total loss. The Owen is worth about \$100,000 and insured for \$75,000. The schooners which were in tow of the Owen are valued at \$100,000. The steamer carried a crew of sixteen men. commanded by Capt. Marion Tenny. and there were eight men on each of

A bitrator. Washington, Nov. 27.-The rname of Emperor William of Germany has been mentioned as available as an arbitrator for the British-Venezuela dispute if Lord Salisbury's answer to Ambassador Bayard proves favorable to arbitration. The suggestion of the Kaiser's name originated in semi-official circles in London. It appears to be conceded that the United States would not act as an arbitrator, owing to the general belief that the sympathy of this country is on the side of Venezuela. Germany's interests in Venezuela are very large, its merchants controlling all the commerce of Maracaibo and other large cities, and German capital has built the leading railroad lines of the country. The report from London that Lord Salisbury has completed his answer to Mr. Bayard is regarded in diplomatic circles here as having a favorable significance. The reply has been delayed so long that was a strong belief among officials that Lord Salisbury would make no answer, taking the position that the subject was one in which the United States had no concern. It is with some satisfaction.therefore.that the authorities here receive the report that an answer of Great Britain is about to
