

Madrid Startled

By the Assassination of the Captain-General.

Old Country Crop Reports Are Not Encouraging.

Several Mission Houses Destroyed by Natives.

Formosa Rebels Driven Back by the Japanese Forces—Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, Cordially Received by the Pope.

BIG BRITISH FLEET.

Constantinople, June 3.—Seventeen British warships are now lying at Beyrouth.

TWELVE MEN DROWNED.

Vienna, June 3.—A ferryboat containing 45 workmen was capsized in the Danube today. Twelve of the men were drowned.

RECEIVED BY THE POPE.

Rome, June 3.—Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, was received by the Pope today, with whom he had a long and cordial conversation in regard to the condition of the Church in America.

FOREIGN MISSIONS DESTROYED.

London, June 3.—A dispatch from Shanghai to the Pall Mall Gazette says: Rioters have destroyed the French Catholic and the English and American Protestant missions at Chongtu Szechuan. The missionaries were given a safe refuge by the native officials.

THE JAPS IN FORMOSA.

London, June 3.—A dispatch from Tokio to the Central News says a dispatch from Formosa, via Cagoshima, states that a portion of the Japanese Imperial Guards landed at Lodi on May 29, and immediately engaged a large body of rebels. Many of the latter were killed, but the Japs lost no men. The Guards advanced to Shan-shai. The remainder of the troops, with ammunition for the expedition, were landed on May 31.

OLD COUNTRY CROPS.

London, June 3.—The Times this morning prints a gloomy review of the English crop prospects. It says that much of the spring grain is no further advanced than generally in the middle of April. The fruit crop, it appears, has also suffered from the drought in Kent. The situation in France is favorable. The outlook for the hay crop is satisfactory. In rye there is generally a light crop, and the average yield of wheat is expected.

UGLY COSTUMES.

A Paris dispatch says: "At sight of them the Paris shopkeeper recoils. Alas! that every woman of them will gown herself in the ridiculous gowns that are mostly sleeves that rule the season. And she will bonnet herself in the hideous bonnets that match the gowns in ugliness. She will wrap herself in the absurd wraps that are designed to conceal any stray lines of beauty in the wearer. Even a child will not go far towards redeeming the extravagant and monstrously ugly costumes that will forever mark the spring of 1895."

THE ITALIAN ELECTIONS.

Rome, June 3.—The triumph of the Radicals in Milan in the recent elections has made a strong impression in political circles. Although the general results of the elections assure the Ministry a considerable numerical majority, the situation is nevertheless difficult. The Extreme Left have been reinforced, especially by the Socialist groups, and the following of Giolitti and Zanardelli has been weakened. The results of the election are: Ministerialists, 338; Opposition, 155; doubtful, 17. The Opposition is made up of 98 Constitutionalists, 40 Radicals and 17 Socialists.

THE SPANISH GOVERNMENT CENSURED.

Madrid, June 3.—The Chamber of Deputies today, by a majority of 78, adopted a motion censuring the Government in connection with its promises made in the budget proposals. The supporters of the Government did not take part in the division, and the Ministers left the House before the vote was taken. The Government will not resign in consequence of the adverse vote, but nevertheless the situation is somewhat critical, owing to the intention of the Republicans to overthrow the Ministry, if possible.

SHOT THE CAPTAIN-GENERAL.

Madrid, June 3.—At 11 o'clock this morning Major Clavijo, an infantry officer, walked into the office of Gen. Primo Rivera, captain-general of Madrid, whom he saluted. As he dropped his hand after touching his hat Major Clavijo drew a revolver, and without a moment's warning fired two shots at the general, both of which took effect in the breast. Gen. Primo Rivera fell to the floor mortally wounded and his assailant attempted to fire again, but Gen. Aymerich, who was present, struck the assassin down with his sabre, and summoning the guards had him taken to prison. It is believed Clavijo is insane.

Another account says:

 A lieutenant of the army has for some time past been paying his addresses to the captain-general's daughter, and today he requested her hand in marriage. The captain-general refused the lieutenant's request, and some hot words were exchanged, resulting in the lieutenant drawing a revolver and shooting the captain-general.

The last sacrament was at once administered to Gen. Primo Rivera, and most of the Cabinet Ministers called to inquire as to his condition.

CUBA'S CONDITION.

As Reported from an American Point of View.

New York, June 3.—The Havana correspondent of the Mail and Express, writing under date of May 28, says that the insurgents in Cuba now have 14,000

well-armed men in the field. He estimates the expense of the Cuban Government for the current year at \$116,000,000, and predicts a deficit of \$71,000,000. The public debt of the island now amounts to nearly \$200,000,000. Last year's sugar crop was sold for \$64,000,000, and yet left the planters financially embarrassed. This year the value of the crop will not pass \$32,000,000, which means complete bankruptcy. The correspondent says that an army officer and Government officials privately admit that Spain cannot hope to retain control of the island unless vital reforms are granted.

Late Canadian News.

Quarrel Between Partially Blind Boys That May Prove Fatal.

Ephraim Clarke, aged 21, was drowned while bathing at Millbrook, Ont., on Sunday.

The Hamilton P. P. A. lodge has been closed, and the lodge property sold to pay the rent.

Mrs. Vermilyea, wife of Evangelist Vermilyea, died on Saturday at Belleville, aged 62.

Miss Mary Falkner, of Belleville, has been appointed lady superintendent of the hospital at Woodstock.

The Earl and Countess of Aberdeen were in Hamilton on Monday for three hours, but were very busy during their short stay.

Fire did \$25,000 or \$30,000 damage to Mr. Fearman's pork packing establishment at Hamilton, but the firm's business will not be interrupted.

The trustees of the Toronto Hospital for Sick Children have appointed Dr. Max Klotz, of Ottawa, and Mr. J. H. Ferguson, of Aylmer, as resident surgeons for the ensuing year.

Edwards, who killed his sister at Outremont, Que., by a blow on the head in March last, was brought up in court in Montreal on Monday, and was judged to be insane.

At the Brantford Institute for the Blind on Saturday, Thomas Rennick, age 18, and Robert Fyle, age 16, who have partial sight, quarreled while playing ball, and Rennick was struck on the head with a bat. He is not expected to recover.

Mary Aikens, a widow, aged 70 years, died on Friday afternoon in Toronto from the effects of an assault last Friday morning in Queen's Park. Frank Smith and Wm. Brown, two notorious criminals, were arrested on suspicion of being the assailants and were identified as such by the victim.

PECULIAR WEATHER.

Western Kansas Under Water—G and Junction Has Two Feet of Snow.

Denver, Col., June 3.—Western Kansas is under water, and opinions differ as to the damage or value of such a visitation at this time, though the best authorities believe the results will be beneficial.

Two feet of snow is reported from Grand Junction.

VICTIMS OF HEAT.

Several Persons Succumb to the Phenomenally Hot Weather.

Hamilton, June 3.—Two deaths have resulted from sunstroke. Thos. Downes, about 52 years of age, employed as a gardener by Bishop Dowling, while working in the garden, was taken ill and died within half an hour. On Friday Cornelius Green, a Grand Trunk laborer, was stricken while at work and became unconscious, dying at 9 o'clock on Saturday evening.

Toronto, June 3.—The excessive heat of the past few days found a victim in James Lyons, an old soldier, who for the past five years has been an employe of Charles Brown, livery stable keeper.

Richmond, Va., June 3.—Bishop Rupert Schindler, of Minnesota, aged 65, died here this morning at St. Mary's Benedictine Priory. His death was caused by apoplexy, superinduced by the extreme heat.

OREST FIRES.

Raging in the Vicinity of Bradford, Pa.—A Village Wiped Out.

Bradford, Pa., June 3.—Forest fires are again raging in this vicinity, and much property is being destroyed. Five rigs, tanks and boiler houses belonging to the Midland Oil Company were destroyed near Hunter's Run, seventeen miles from Kane, yesterday.

Fires are raging at Chipmunk, Tully, and along the lines of the Erie and Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railroads between this city and Johnsonburg.

The settlement of Coon Run, in Elk county, ten miles from Kane, is reported to be completely wiped out. There were 25 dwelling houses in the village. Before telegraph communication was shut off 46 oil rigs were reported destroyed. To the north, near New York State line, forest fires surrounded Knapp's Creek. Communication is shut off, and the damage cannot be ascertained. A message from Knapp's Creek, via Olean, says 50 rigs belonging to Messrs. Curtis, Burns and Russell have been destroyed. The town is completely surrounded by fire, and should a fresh wind spring up tonight the town will undoubtedly be destroyed.

Everything between Russell City and Coon Run has been wiped out, including all the rigs and tanks, the pump station of the Standard Oil Company and that of the Elk Pipe Line Company. Russell City will probably go, as a strong west wind is now fanning the flames. The fire has leaped across the railroad in the cut lumber and logs and the side of Russell City. Barnsdall & Co. had at least 75 rigs between Coon Run and Russell.

Olean, N. Y., June 3.—Fierce forest fires are again in the vicinity of Knapp's Creek and the State line, and much oil property has been destroyed. The loss in this city will reach \$20,000. Relief parties will be sent from here tonight. Much apprehension is being felt among oil men.

THREE TRAINMEN KILLED.

McCook, Neb., June 3.—The train sent out yesterday afternoon to crib in the washouts east of McCook, went into a washout between Esor and Ocoford, and the engineer, fireman and brakeman were killed.

ALL SORTS OF WEATHER.

Killing Heat, Drenching Rains, and Snow Over the Border.

Several Deaths in the Big Cities—Many Prostrations.

Naples, N. Y., June 4.—The long succession of excessively hot days, with no dew at night, is telling disastrously upon vegetation in Southern Ontario county. For six successive days the mercury has averaged 92 at midday and 78 at midnight, and there has been no rain for ten days. Strawberries, just ripening, are drying on the stem.

SNOW AND RAIN.

Minneapolis, Minn., June 4.—Advises from all over Minnesota and the Dakotas are favorable to the crop situation. The rains have been falling heavily during the past week, and at some places notably Pierre, S. D., over three inches of rain have fallen during the past 24 hours. Since the first of the year there has been an average of nearly ten inches of rain in most parts of the Northwest and the ground is thoroughly drenched. Two inches of snow has fallen at Lead, S. D.

Chicago, June 4.—Reports from points through Illinois and Indiana generally indicate intense heat. Crops are being badly injured and will be ruined unless rain comes soon.

NO SNOW HERE.

St. Louis, Mo., June 4.—All hot weather records for the first week in June in this city were passed today. At 2:30 o'clock today the 100 mark was reached. Two quartermen in the suburbs and two laborers in East St. Louis were prostrated with the heat.

Chicago, Ill., June 4.—Yesterday was the hottest day of the year and the fatalities were the most numerous. Four deaths and several serious prostrations were reported.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 4.—Yesterday afternoon the mercury registered 94 degrees. Five deaths in Pittsburg and Altoona were reported.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 4.—The thermometer at 3 p.m. reached 96 degrees. There were 45 cases of heat prostration here yesterday and four deaths.

WILL SHOW UP MARS.

Great Glass of the Yerkes Telescope Now Finished.

The Biggest Lens in the World—This Instrument Will Have Enormous Power.

(The New York World.)

We are likely during the coming summer to learn more about Mars than astronomers during all the history of their science have discovered up to the present time about the planet and its peculiarities. It required the 26-inch telescope of the United States Naval Observatory to discover the satellites of Mars. Then the Lick telescope, with its 36-inch glass, was built, and immediately the three strange signal lights on Mars were observed.

Now the great 40-inch lens—the biggest telescope glass ever made—on which Alvan E. Clark has been working for more than a year at Cambridge, Mass., for the Yerkes telescope, is completed and will soon be shipped to its destination. The big telescope at the Naval Observatory had been unable to bring out the signal lights of Mars as the telescopes before that time had failed to note the satellites. The Yerkes telescope will be so much bigger than the Lick, now the largest in the world, that astronomers are confident astonishing discoveries may be made as soon as it is seen.

Who knows what the looking through a great 40-inch glass of this huge instrument, astronomers will be enabled to make out definitely the system of signals which the Martians are believed to be using in an effort to communicate with the inhabitants of Earth? Even the great canal system of Mars, as is now suspected by more than one, may turn out to be a gigantic semaphore.

Upon the other hand, when these canals fill up with water and irrigate the land, which turns green and yields crops, as Flammarion has witnessed, the Yerkes telescope may show the process of cultivation, here noting where a field has been cut and there where a fire has ravaged. The strange lights in the angle may no longer be mysterious and puzzling to astronomers, while the black dots and dashes on the white polar caps of the planet may be deciphered. Railroads, waterworks, ships and cities existing on the surface of Mars may come out under this huge telescope, the glass of which has just been photographed in the workshop of Mr. Clark.

MARRYING MILLIONS.

One of Uncle Sam's Richest Daughters Engaged—Miss Rockefeller.

New York, June 4.—The engagement of Miss Edith Rockefeller and Mr. Harold McCormick was announced yesterday. Miss Edith Rockefeller is frequently spoken of as one of the two wealthiest heiresses in America. The other is her sister, Miss Alta Rockefeller. They are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Rockefeller. It is estimated that they will each come into \$35,000,000. There seems no reason why even such a limit as this should be put on their prospective fortunes when the money that flows into their father's coffers as one of the Standard Oil magnates is considered.

Harold McCormick is the son of Cyrus H. McCormick, the reaper manufacturer. He is about 21 years old. He is a great tennis player. His sister Anita married Emmons Blaine.

BRAVE ALBERT BROWN.

Toronto, June 3.—Albert Brown, a clever swimmer, the master mechanic in a theatrical company, and who has just returned home for the holidays, yesterday saved three persons from drowning. Two were named Byers and Sparks, who were thrown out of a yacht, the third being a boy named Wm. Carrie, who got beyond his depth while bathing. Brown holds eighteen medals.
