"Mr. Provost and Gentlemen of the Town Council of Wick,-As the youngest burgess and guild brother, I have great diffidence in saying a word upon this occasion. I feel great difficulty in finding words in which to express what I desire to say. But your address on this occasion has increased the difficulty, by reason of the great kindness which has been manifested in it towards me from beginning to end. heartily, and with pleasure, accept the honor which you have just conferred upon me. (Applause.) I will appreciate it very highly in view of the very distinguished men upon whom the honor has been conferred heretofore, but what I specially appreciate it for is that it comes to me from this royal and ancient burgh of Wick, the chief town of Caithness, the county of my father's and mother's birthplace, and all their forefathers, for I know not how many generations—(Hear, hear, and applause)—and as coming to me because of my relation to this county and people, and because of the position which I have had the satisfaction of reaching in the country where I was born, and where I had lived so long, and were I am living still. MAD LEAP

Of a Montreal Man-Jumps 200 Feet From a Precipitous Cliff-A Com-Ontario's Prime Minister Accepts the panien Has a Fatal Fall-Liquor the Cause.

> Montreal, July 21 .- A party composed of four Government messengers, named respectively, Francois Prevoist, Paul Cote, J. Berthiaumen and J. Carmon, went fishing up the Montmorency River yesterday. After some time they resolved to try their luck below the falls. They proceeded by the high cliffs on the east side of Montmorency, with the intention of walking down to the foot of the cliff by a pathway.

Cote undertook to lead the party down. He had not proceeded far when he was carried off, his feet having slipped downwards with loosened turf. He fell down the almost perpendicular sides of the cliff, 50 feet below. Caron and Berthiaumeau ran by another path to the foot of the promontory, where Cote lay senseless.

Meanwhile Prevost had witnessed the terrible fall from above, and was seen by a woman to take off his hat and coat, and then leaped to eternity, 200 feet below. His body was terribly mangled.

Death was instantaneous. Cote was still alive, but it is thought his injuries are so serious that he will not live. Liquor seems to have been the cause of this sad affair. An inquest will be

FIBRE CHAMOIS VS. BUCKSKIN. The Canadian Fibre Chamois Company have entered an action in the Supreme Court for an injunction and for \$5,000 damages against Boisseau & Co., the owners of La Cie, Generale des Bazars, of St. Lawrence street, upon the alleged ground that the defendants have been infringing plaintiffs' trade mark by selling an interlining known as "Textile Buckskin," under the name of Fibre Chamois, and to purchasers asking for the latter. The plaintiffs also complain of a sign displayed in one of the windows of defendants' store, which it is alleged is calculated to deceive the public into buying what is called an imitation article under the belief that they are getting the genuine article.
