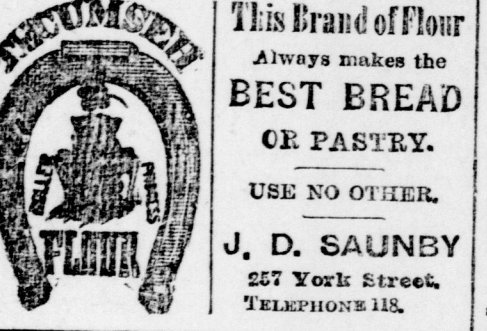

Is your name on or off the list?
No one can be certain unless he personally inspects it.

The only necessary qualifications are:

1. You are a British subject.
2. You are 21 years of age or upwards.
3. You reside in the city.

This afternoon and evening will be a most suitable time to examine the lists and make the necessary affidavit, which cost the voter nothing. Be sure now, and avoid disappointment on election day.

—The Puritan Waltz Club will hold an Assembly in the Masonic Temple banquet hall on Tuesday evening, Feb. 27.

—How the lively keepers did smile the last two days. It was almost impossible to secure a turnout unless ordered in advance.

—The Valkyrie Pleasure Club entertained a number of young people at a dance in the club rooms on Friday evening. A most enjoyable time was spent.

—Alma College notes: On Thursday and Friday Miss Sisk was the guest of Miss Priddis, London. Misses Sisk and Westman attended Prof. Pococke's concert last Thursday evening.

A London Lady Killed.

The name of the London lady killed in Toronto Friday was Miss Mary Ranton and not Barton, as the telegraph stated. An account is here given:

Miss Mary Ranton, aged 38, of London, who was visiting with Mr. C. H. Hebden, at 209 Westmoreland street, Toronto, was killed by a runaway horse in Yonge street Friday evening. A person in the employ of Mr. W. H. Stone, the undertaker, was driving along Yonge street about 5 o'clock, when a bolt came out of the cutter near Gerrard street and the shafts fell. The horse immediately dashed down the sidewalk, leaving the rig behind. The thoroughfare was crowded with pedestrians. Miss Ranton was unable to get out of the way of the horse and was knocked down at Edward street. It was found that she was thrown with terrific force to the stone pavement. It was found that Miss Ranton's injuries consisted of bruises on the right side of the head, which caused hemorrhage of the brain, resulting

in death three hours later. The unfortunate lady never fully recovered consciousness. Miss Ranton was born in the township of Biddulph, and was a daughter of the late John Ranton, of that place. She had been for the past seven years a resident of this city, her occupation being that of a dressmaker, and her residence, 557 Talbot street. About two months ago deceased went to visit her mother, Mrs. John Morcombe, who resides in Masonville, and left that place two weeks ago to visit friends in Toronto, intending to return here in a short time. Miss Ranton was a devout Christian and an active member of Queen's Avenue Methodist Church. She leaves, besides her mother, two brothers and three sisters, one brother being Mr. S. Ranton, editor of the St. Thomas Times.

Peter Jackson Was Here.

Peter Jackson was in the city for several minutes yesterday, just long enough for a couple of hundred curiosity-seekers to file through the car and get a hasty glimpse of the dusky jaw-breaker. His coming was unheralded but there is always a crowd on the street promenade, especially on a sunny afternoon like yesterday. When the Wabash pulled in the news spread quickly through the throng and a rush was made for the car. Mr. Jackson was bound for Toronto and was traveling with an Uncle Tom's Cabin Company, in which he takes the leading role. Another sporting celebrity, "Parson" Davies, takes the part of the party and his part of the performance is to spar three scientific rounds with the man who expects to "do" Corbett in June next. When the crowd made for the car it divided and entered by both doors. Then there was a struggle as the conflicting streams surged past one another. But they all saw Peter. And the sight was far from edifying. Mr. Jackson himself is not bad looking, but he had one of his large and powerful looking hands filled with cards, and when the other hand was not busy throwing down the necessary card it was hovering lovingly over a pile of greenbacks by his side. His partner was plentifully supplied with bills and silver, and both went on playing totally oblivious to the curious gaze. A practical joker cried "All aboard" while the car was filled with people, and a wild scramble was made for fresh air several minutes before the train started.

MUSIC AND THE DRAMA.

Over \$20,000 Cleared for Charity at One Performance—Prof. Bristol's Wonderful Horses—Those Doodle Dogs.

CLEARED OVER \$20,000 FOR CHARITY. Friday's New York Times says: "Of all the social multitudes seen beneath one roof this winter that which gathered in the Metropolitan Opera House last night for the benefit of various charities, and to hear superb gleamings from great operas, was by far the largest and most fashionable. At the box office it was officially announced that over \$20,000 was cleared. Selections were given from several operas."

The following is from the Newark (N. J.) Daily Advertiser: "A large and appreciative audience greeted Prof. D. M. Bristol's Equestrian Curriculeum at Miner's Theater, last evening. Almost every one is aware that this remarkable troupe consists of about 30 wonderfully trained and beautiful horses, the tricks and antics of which are so numerous and varied that they are able to entertain an audience for a whole evening. The opening of the show takes the form of a school, in which various tasks and duties are assigned to the horses. The most intelligent and accomplished of the horses is Sultan, a beautiful and high-spirited animal, whose mathematical education would compare favorably with that of many a child. He tells time and works sums in arithmetic, and even gives the proper answers to questions proposed by persons in the audience. The most conspicuous and hardest worked member of the company is Denver, a mule. He is at once the comedian and philosopher of the show."

"The second part of the entertainment consists mainly of feats of physical skill and balancing, many of which undoubtedly require the exercise of a reasoning faculty. Among the more pleasing exhibitions are a game of leap-frog and the walking of the tight rope by Dynamite, a diminutive mule. A brilliant effect is created by a military drill, participated in by all the horses."
