

FIFTEEN KILLED FORTY INJURED

Milwaukee Railway Disaster Worse Than Reported.

THE DEATH LIST WILL INCREASE

Canadians Drowned at Old Orchard Mo-Mother and Children Perish in a Creamery.

Old Orchard, Me., Aug. 7.—George Ford, a former alderman of Ottawa, Walter Dasher, chief train dispatcher of the Grand Trunk Railroad, Montreal, and Miss Florence J. Thomas of Montreal, were drowned while bathing at Ocean Park today. Dasher's body has been recovered.

WORSE AND WORSE.
Marshalltown, Ia., Aug. 7.—Today's developments show that fifteen persons were killed and forty injured in the freight wreck on the Milwaukee road yesterday. Of the injured two or three cannot recover. It is thought possible that more bodies may be found, for the wreckage has not been entirely cleared away.

THREE BURNED TO DEATH.
Middleton, N. Y., Aug. 8.—Mrs. Emilio Lombardi and two of her small children were burned to death yesterday at the Union Dairy Company's creamery in the town of Crawford, this county. Emilio Lombardi is a cheesemaker, and occupied the upper portion of the factory with his wife and five children. When the fire was discovered the husband succeeded in saving three of the children, but was unable to rescue his wife and two infants. The building was destroyed by the fire.

FATALLY HURT.
Belleville, Aug. 7.—George S. Morton, a farmer who lived near Moira, Hastings county, was killed in a hayrack in hay when the whiffletrees broke. One of the fragments struck Morton in the abdomen, causing a puncture from the effects of which he died Wednesday night.

FATAL ACCIDENT TO A BRAVE BOY.

New York, Aug. 8.—Cesar Perrier, a brave little boy, was killed in the freight yards at the foot of Ashburton avenue, Yonkers. The lad lived at No. 25 East Twenty-third street, Manhattan. With other boys he had started to take a ride on some freight cars, and they were carried further than had intended to go. In the Yonkers yards the bumping of the cars had thrown him to the ground with one leg over the track. A car's wheels passed over the leg and cut it off. St. John's Hospital, Yonkers, quickly sent for the boy, but he died while the wounded boy lay quietly. He seemed so cheerful that in the ambulance the surgeon felt sure that the boy did not know what dire injury had come to him, and the young doctor sought to hide with a blanket the bleeding stump of his severed leg.

"I know it's off, Mr. Doctor," the little fellow said. "What's the use of hiding my eyes?"

Then, when he was placed in a cot in the hospital, he said to the nurse, "My mother always told me if I ever got hurt to ask for a priest. I'd like to see one now." In obedience to the summons came Rev. Father Brady, of St. Joseph's Church. The little fellow prayed calmly, and without having uttered a single sob of despair, died.

BOY DROWNED.
Kingston, Aug. 8.—Frank Patterson, aged 11, was drowned at Wolf Island on Wednesday. He belonged to Vermont, but lived with an uncle, Frank Woodrow, who was repairing a water fence, standing on a wagon, when their horses bolted into deep water, and the two persons jumped. The uncle took the lad on his back, but to save himself had to drop his burden, and the lad was drowned. The horses got to a place of safety with the wagon.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Madoc, Ont., Aug. 7.—A young man named Sutcliffe, from England, and employed on C. W. Bacon's farm, accidentally shot himself in the stomach last evening. As the accident occurred about seven miles from town, some time elapsed before a doctor could be procured. It is not yet known whether it will result fatally. The

young man has relatives in Tweed, Ont.

MILLIONAIRE'S SON FOUND DEAD.
New York, Aug. 8.—A body found in Central Park, with a bullet hole in the head, has been identified as that of Herman Kellar, said to be the son of a Breslau, multi-millionaire. Kellar resided in New York. His widow says he left home July 7, and that bank deposits of several thousands of dollars to his credit have been withdrawn. The pockets of Kellar's clothing were turned out when the body was found, and no pistol has been discovered near the spot.

THE ONTARIO PHARMACISTS

Appoint a Committee With a View of Having the Act Amended.

Toronto, Aug. 8.—The council of the Ontario College of Pharmacy, at its meeting yesterday, appointed W. B. Graham, John Hargreave and G. S. Gibbons a committee to receive suggestions from the special committee appointed by the Division Association respecting changes in the Pharmacy Act. The committee will meet in Toronto on Tuesday, Sept. 2, and will prepare a draft bill for the approval of the council, after which it will be submitted to the Legislature. The council refused to grant a diploma to an apprentice who had not completed his apprenticeship at the time of passing his examination, but who has since done so, and who will have to wait another year. This was done under a rule that has been in existence for five years, and enunciates the policy of the council in the future.

However, a notice of motion was given to rescind this order. It was announced that a Toronto firm had been fined for selling crude carbolic acid. It was not generally known by druggists that this was an offense.

Two Girls Save a Man's Life.

Atlantic City, Aug. 8.—Charles Cuskaden, a wealthy Pittsburgher, was rescued from the surf by Miss Katherine Tongue, and Miss Blanche Sonheim, of Philadelphia. The rescue was one of the most daring and heroic of the season. Cuskaden got caught in the channel current, which bore him seaward. With the help of the two girls Cuskaden was able to get ashore.

ANOTHER DASH FOR THE POLE

Ziegler, the Rich New Yorker, Still Trusts Baldwin.

BOUND TO PURSUE THE SEARCH

Backer of the Expedition Once Traveled the Country With Dr. Kane's Panorama.

New York, Aug. 8.—Evelyn Briggs Baldwin, Arctic explorer, whose expedition on the America has returned to Henningsvaag, Norway, after an expenditure of hundreds of thousands of dollars by William Ziegler, must discover the north pole or forever forego the sight of Ziegler's face.

Ziegler is as fully determined on this as he was when Baldwin sailed away a year or more ago. Ziegler is a man of determination, and one who reckons on results only. "I have told Baldwin to carry the Stars and Stripes to the north pole or never show his face in New York again," said Ziegler at the time the expedition started, and he reiterated the statement yesterday and acknowledged, in the face of disappointment, that he meant every word of it.

If at any time Ziegler felt disconsolate at the non-success of Baldwin, his spirits were revived when he received this cable dispatch: "Tromsø, Norway.—Cheer up. Awaiting Frithjof. Beware canards. Fearless."

"There is no signature to the dispatch," Ziegler said, "but it was unquestionably sent by Baldwin. The Frithjof referred to is the steamship I sent out with the America as a sort of consort or transport to accompany the America, the vessel Baldwin was on. As for the 'mysterious deaths' on board the America I have not received one word."

"There may have been a meeting on board the America which necessitated his return," Ziegler said, "but Baldwin since last—let me see—last July."

"You know, I've sent another expedition to the pole, Pierre L'Arrois on that. He's a Russian. Why, he can walk 60 miles a day. This expedition left Tromsø on July 1."

"Have you lost confidence in Baldwin?" was asked.

"I have not lost faith in him," Ziegler replied, "but naturally I feel disappointed in his non-success for the present. I don't think he'll come back without making a further effort. If he did come back after a failure, I would not want to see him. I was never an explorer, but I've been a hunter and fisherman all my life. I started in the exploring business when Dr. Kane went around the country with a panorama."

"Well, Dr. Kane had all the Arctic scenes, and you know that there were stories in some of the Norwegian papers. Ziegler got up from an easy chair to illustrate. "Back of the panorama there was a cylinder and over that was a cloth, and when the cylinder was turned with a crank it gave out the sound of a terrific wind. Well, I was the wind turner, as they called it."

"Yes, I'd grind the cylinder and then run out in front of the panorama to look at the scene," and Ziegler laughed at this recollection of his youth.

Oldest Actress in America Dying.

New York, Aug. 8.—Mrs. Eliza Young, aged 92, the oldest actress in America, is dying at the Actors' Fund Home in West New Brighton. A fall which fractured her hip brought on the decline. Mrs. Young's stage career in England and America covered a period of nearly 70 years. She came to the United States about 1850 and played with Clara Morris, Edwin Forrest, Lawrence Barrett, Edwin Booth and Mrs. Langtry.

CROKER DROPS OUT

The Old Boss Says He Will Never Return to Politics.

New York, Aug. 8.—The Herald says: "I am through with politics forever. I have done enough for my friends."

This is the message sent across the sea by Richard Croker, of Wantage, England, erstwhile chief of Tammany, but now a country squire devoted to his horses and to his farm.

The word came on the arrival of Maurice Untermyer on the Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosser, who spent two days with Croker during Derby week in June.

"Sobriety and carefully Mr. Croker talked over the past and present with me," said Untermyer. "He stated positively that he would not visit the United States this year, nor would he say definitely whether he would come in two or three years. I cannot say that he will ever return."

Suicide at Palmerston.

Palmerston, Aug. 8.—Mr. Thomas Laing, a farm laborer of this district, committed suicide Wednesday night by taking strychnine. He took the dose in the fire hall and was found by the chief at 6 o'clock. After lingering till 9:30 he succumbed in great agony.

Boers Coming Here.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—The Government has been officially advised from London of the intended visit of a Boer delegation to study farming conditions and pick up general business ideas. The Government has requested to see that they are afforded every facility for attaining the object of their visit.

Carbonic Acid With Beer.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 8.—Wm. Meyers, aged 65, who has been living at 147 King street, suicided last night by swallowing carbonic acid, which he took in a glass of beer while in a hotel on West Market street. He was removed to the Emergency Hospital, and died one minute after he got there. A quarrel with a woman with whom he was living was responsible for his rash act.

Bryan Tells a Joke on Bryan.

Washington, Aug. 8.—William Jennings Bryan made a flying visit to Washington recently. The leader of the Western Democracy was in a buoyant and witty frame of mind, and told many good stories on himself. He said that not long ago in a western town he had occasion to get shaved. The barber, a colored man, felt highly complimented by the opportunity of shaving a man who had been a candidate for the presidency, and when the operation was over Mr. Bryan gave him a silver dollar. Some weeks afterward, traveling that way, he met an old friend in the same town, who told him he had got the barber in trouble. "How's that?" Mr. Bryan asked. "Why, he has been up before the Barber's Union, and has charges preferred against him, and was then put on trial for shaving a man who had been a candidate for the presidency."

"Oh, yes, you paid him all right, but the other barbers said that he was cutting under, and would have charged \$5 for shaving a dead man."
