Indianapolis, July 10.-If the purpose of the committee on the constitution of the National Manufacturers' Association shall be approved by the executive committee and ratified by a vote of the members, the organization will enlarge its scope and become the pro-paganda of aggressive ideas and methods in restraint of organized labor, backed by a fund of \$1,500,000. The executive committee finished a two days' session last night, after going thoroughly over a new constitution. The new constitution plans a federation of the employers of the country to resist the aggression of organized labor through its federated organizations.
