## DENOUNCED GRAB; EULOGIZED BOB

Salary Bill and Gamy Topics of Discussion at Conservative Gathering.

A meeting of the members of the western district of the Ontario Liberal-Conservative Association was held in the local Conservative Club yesterday.

The association is composed of 23 districts and nearly all were represented.

A resolution was adopted which condemned the Liberal Government for its alleged extravagance in expenditures, and also the increase in sessional allowance which was voted by members of both parties at the last session of the House of Commons.

The resolution concluded as follows: "That we approve of placing candidates in every constituency that may be opened pledged to oppose the further extravagant expenditure of public money and repudiate any member of the close of the last session, turned the salary and indemnity bill, so that the electoral, may choose men to fill those high and honorable positions who will faithfully serve the country and not seek personal gain."

Major Beattie presided, and he made a speech in which he eulogized Mr. May for the part he played against the Ross Government. He also stated that a necessary consequence to the unduly increased sessional allowance of the Liberal Government was a political party is to multiply the number of civil servants in our public institutions, and he trusted the present administration will deal with the question in a fearless manner and dispense with the services of all those not necessary for an efficient administration of the public affairs.

**INSULT COSTS \$200**  
Bartender Fined for Addressing Girl on the Street.

Chicago, Sept. 14.—Thomas Foster, a bartender, 1213 Wabash avenue, was fined \$200 and costs by Justice Prindiville at the Harrison street police court on a charge of disorderly conduct.

A young woman who refused to reveal her identity in the police court, appeared as a witness against the man. She said she was 19 years old and told Justice Prindiville she came to Chicago on a steamship excursion.

"I know little about Chicago," she declared, "but I was in Wabash avenue until I met this man. He spoke to me and I answered. Then he tried to have me enter a building. I became alarmed and when I saw a policeman I asked that the man be arrested."

"What is your name?" she was asked.

"I refuse to tell," she said, looking alarmed and grasping her blue veil tightly as though she feared someone would attempt to see her features more closely.

"I must go home to mother in Benton Harbor at once. She is alarmed, I know. I should have returned home last night."

Foster denied the charges made by the woman. "She spoke to me and I spoke to her," he said to Justice Prindiville. "I did not know who she was."

"It is an old story that a woman coming here on a visit should be subjected to such insults," said Justice Prindiville, and he fined the man \$200 and costs, the largest amount possible. It is really fortunate for you that this woman does not care to take the matter to the criminal court. If she did I think you would be punished more severely."

**'Suing His Aged Father.**  
Toronto, Sept. 15.—A family lawsuit came up before the master-in-chambers yesterday. Wm. Houston, of Sarnia, is suing his father, James, who is approaching seventy years of age. The son claims that twenty years ago the father promised to bequeath all his property to the son if the latter would support him for the balance of his days. A quarrel having arisen, the old man threatens to dispose of his possessions in other ways.

## COUNCIL SPECIAL WAS NOT HELD

Aldermen Too Busy to Meet and Talk Over Street Railway Extension.

The special meeting of the city council peters out last night. Several of the city fathers were so busy at the Fair that they found it impossible to attend, and there was no quorum.

Ald. Stevely, however, produced a letter from President Everett, in which the street railway company's answer to the high street extension proposition, as given in yesterday's Advertiser, was presented in a formal way.

The president's letter put the matter in plain terms. The city must say at once what it wants the company to do. If the Wortley road stub is to be built, then the company should be notified at once, as the line must be in operation by October 1. If the city wants the Edward street line in lieu of the Wortley road stub, then Mr. Everett asked a year's time. If the stub is built the company proposes to run the cars which now operate on the Dundas and Market line over it, and they feel it will not be an elephant on their hands.

Quite a little informal discussion was indulged in by the mayor and aldermen, and by Messrs. McKillop, Judah and Ivey, the two former legal lights representing the people who are in favor of the Edward street belt, and the latter the company.

Mr. McKillop objected to the proposal of the mayor to have the stub line built this year, and then to take a census next year. Mr. McKillop thinks that this would mean that the council would say that South London had received all the street railway that is coming to it, and he intends to push for the Edward street belt.

The matter will not be again considered until Monday night.

Deceased married Miss Elsie Jackson, of Dorchester, and is survived by the following children: William H., of Philadelphia; Mrs. J. A. Orr, of Detroit, and William and Mary, at home. He also leaves a brother, Robert, of Ingersoll, and one sister, Mrs. J. R. Greenway, of Brantford.

**ONE GIRL UPSETS COMPLETE SYSTEM**  
New Form of P. O. Money Orders Made Necessary by Forgeries of a Girl.

New York, Sept. 15.—The entire postal money-order system of the United States has been turned upside down by the 21-year-old Brooklyn woman who, it is alleged, issued forged money orders from the sub-station of the postoffice at Fourteenth street and Sixth avenue.

For some time the Government experts at Washington had desired to avoid frauds, but it was not until the young postal clerk's operations were detected that the experts discovered a way to prevent crookedness in that branch of the service.

All of the outstanding blanks are being called in and new blanks, like exchange orders, are being printed at Washington in a rush. The new order when torn from the book by the postal clerk, leaves a stub which shows the amount of the money order.

The auditor of the New York postoffice said that the name of the missing clerk of the Sixth avenue sub-station is Lydia A. Engelke, and that she is 21 years old and lives with her parents somewhere in Brooklyn.

The auditor said Miss Engelke's method was to issue money orders for \$100 each, and to deposit \$1 in the cash account of her sub-station in each case and cash the orders at a private bank further up Sixth avenue, representing herself to be F. J. Needham. By accident, the postal authorities say, she chose the name of a Fourteenth street publisher.

She issued money orders passed through the clearing house and the general postoffice without detection until last Saturday week, when seven hundred money orders for \$10 each, cashed the day they were issued, aroused suspicion and led to inquiry and the clerk's flight.

The auditor said that with the existing form of money order blank it would be possible for a money order clerk to issue 100 forged orders for \$100 each, clearing \$10,000. As there are 248 of these offices in New York alone, the authorities were staggered by Miss Engelke's operations and the peril involved.

The missing young woman has, so far, eluded the cleverest postal detectives in the service.
