### IMPEACHED JUDGE HOOKER

Must Answer Serious Charges.

Albany, N. Y., June 21.-An extraordinary session of the Legislature, the first since 1899, began today a few minutes after noon. The business to be taken up was presented in both Houses in a message of Governor Higgins, recommending for consideration the conduct of Warren B. Hooker, and the question of his removal from the office of justice of the supreme court. The charges against Justice Hooker are a formal statement substantially identical with the findings of fact and conclusions of the assembly judiciary committee, made to the assembly as the result of its protracted investigation of the Hooker case during the regular session of the Legislature. The document is in the form of 'statement of the cause alleged for removal," and begins as follows: "That the said Warren B. Hooker, while a representative in Congress, prior to the 10th day of November, 1898, and while a justice of the supreme court of the State of New York, since said 10th day of November, 1898, has been wilfully guilty of corrupt, unlawful and moral acts, which have tended to bring and have brought the said office of justice of the supreme court and the administration of justice into con-tempt, and which show a personal nfitness on the part of said Warren B. Hooker to hold and occupy the office of justice of the supreme court, which
