The Grand Opera House lease has changed hands. Fitzpatrick & Stewart, who have controlled it from the 1st of September, 1906, drop out, and the lease goes to the Bennett's Theatrical Enter. prises Company, which controls vaudeville theaters in London, Ottawa, Montreal, and which will build a vaudeville theater in Hamilton shortly.

Mr. John R. Stewart will remain in the position of manager of the house. The change in leasehold effects a change in the bookings of the theater. For five years up till Sept. 1 of last vear. Klaw & Erlanger, better known as the hub of the big theatrical syndicate controlled the bookings. Then Mr. J. B. Fitzpatrick, Mr. Stewart's partner, arranged with the Shuberts to
