**FOG AND STORM
BOTHER MAURETANIA**

New York, Nov. 22.—Another obstacle in the shape of a dense fog is delaying the new Cunard liner Mauretania, thus further marring what was confidently expected to be a most successful maiden voyage. Soon after leaving Queenstown last Sunday morning the big steamer ran into a severe storm, which lasted the better part of three days. Terrible head seas and high gales retarded the splendid speed of the vessel, and by the time these conditions changed it was known by means of the wireless telegraph that the westward record of her sister ship, the Lusitania, could not be eclipsed on this trip. However, the steamer was put to top speed and some balm was offered to those on board when the steamer's run for the fourth day showed 624 knots, thus topping the Lusitania, which took the blue ribbon for the best day's run on the last voyage by six knots. It was believed that the Mauretania would reach Sandy Hook by daybreak Friday but this hope was shattered when the Mauretania ran into a dense fog off the New England coast late last night and speed necessarily had to be materially reduced.

Principal Waller, of Huron College, at the meeting of St. Paul's Club, held in Cronyn Hall, last evening. Principal Waller discussed the poem thoroughly and explained many of the passages. In concluding, he showed the many points of similarity between Saul and the first book of Samuel. Canon Dann presided, and conveyed to the speaker a hearty vote of thanks passed by the members. "The Tower of Babel and the Origin of Language" will be discussed by Canon Dann at the next meeting of the club.

Twenty Cents a Day.

The report of the House of Industry, read at the Elgin County Council, showed 51 inmates in the institution at the end of the year, 18 having been admitted during the twelve months. Six of these were from Bayham, four from Southwold, three from Vienna, two each from Aldborough and Dunwich, and one each from Yarmouth, Dorchester, Aylmer, Port Stanley and Dutton, while one inmate was born in the house. The total expenditure during the year was \$6,320.33, and the amount actually expended for support of the inmates was \$425.35, this making the average cost per day for each inmate twenty cents, and a yearly expense of \$72.50.

The ceremony was performed by Very Rev. Dean Davis, Miss Dora Lye, of Stratford, assisted Miss Fewings, while Mr. Charles Hickson, Toronto, brother of the groom, acted as best man. The bride carried white bride roses, and pink roses were carried by the bridesmaid, Miss Lorette Fewings, made a charming little flower girl. Mr. and Mrs. Hickson left later for Toronto and other eastern points, and on their return will reside at 631 St. James street.

"SHRIEKING SISTERHOOD"

Suffragettes Carrying Out Threats to Disturb Liberal Meetings.

London, Nov. 22.—With the resumption of the political campaign which is now in full swing "the shrieking sisterhood" as the women suffragettes have come to be commonly known, are actively pursuing their threatened plan of upsetting all Liberal meetings. Gatherings at which members of the cabinet are to speak are especially selected by them. The victims last week were Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the premier, and Herbert H. Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer. Both these speakers had difficulty in getting a hearing, their meeting being attended by serious disorders.

Last night Herbert Gladstone, secretary of state for home affairs, and David Lloyd-George, president of the board of trade, speaking respectively at Leeds and Glasgow, were similarly treated, and a number of the suffragettes had to be ejected from the meetings.
