HARVEST SERVICES AT CHRIST CHURCH

Annual Thanksgiving Services of Church and Sunday School.

The annual harvest thanksgiving services of Christ Church were held yesterday. There were large congregations both morning and evening, and there was a special children's service in the afternoon. The church was appropriately decorated with grain, fruit and flowers. The musical portions of the service, under the direction of Mr. Chert, were well rendered. In the morning Mr. Harry Wheatcroft sang "I Know That My Redeemer Liveth," and in the evening Miss Cullis sang sweetly, "Glory to God in the Highest."

The rector, Rev. R. S. W. Howard, preached at each service, this being his first Sunday at home, after an absence of three months abroad. He spoke on the general subject of thanksgiving. In the evening he dealt more particularly with the blessings which we enjoy as Canadians, as contrasted with the life in the old land, where there are so many out of employment, and where poverty is so great. He also spoke of the higher moral standard that seems to prevail here, as especially illustrated by the way women crowd the drinking places in the large cities of England and Scotland. He concluded by a brief reference to the great Pan-Anglican Congress, which he attended in London.

MR. W. J. GLENDENNING IS DEAD IN TORONTO

Former Well-Known Londoner Passes Away in the Queen City.

The friends of Mr. W. J. Glendenning, formerly of this city, will be grieved to learn of his death at the home of his son, Charles, in Toronto. He resided in this city for many years, and had made a large number of friends.

He is survived by the following sons and daughters, W. J., of Rossland, B. C.; Fred, of Chicago; Charles E., of Toronto; Miss Minnie, of this city; Mrs. A. E. Connor, of San Antonio, Texas; and Mrs. W. J. Boyle, of this city. She is at present in England.

The body will be shipped from Toronto, and the funeral, which will be of a private nature, will be held on the arrival of the train Tuesday morning.

GETS LARGE ROOM

Harry Thaw Given Big Hospital Ward in New Jail.

Saratoga, N. Y., Sept. 13.—Sheriff Lane, of Westchester County, who is a delegate to the Republican state convention, learned today that Harry K. Thaw had been transferred from the Dutchess County jail to his custody.

He telegraphed instructions to the warden of the White Plains jail to place Thaw in the hospital ward of the prison on his arrival there tomorrow.

Sheriff Lane said that this ward is a large room, about 20 feet square, with barred windows and doors, and that Thaw would have no exercise except what he could get within its

walls. There would be no objection, he said, to his having meals sent in from a restaurant.

HEARST AND BRYAN.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 11.—Two thousand persons listened to the formal nomination of John Temple Graves as nominee of the Independence party for vice-president of the United States at the Casino Theatre tonight. Presidential Nominee Hilsen, William Randolph Hearst and a score of others prominent in the party were on the platform.

Mr. Hearst in his address declared that Wm. J. Bryan was sincere and should not have approached him four months ago with the proposition to "support him (Bryan) in the campaign if he (Bryan) would support him (Hearst) in the next campaign."

London Missionaries in the Orient

Mr. and Mrs. Westaway, the missionaries who left London last October for Chentu, China, are having rather peculiar experiences in the field of labor.

A letter recently received by a friend in this city states that the heat being intense the coolies had left the mountains, as they were unable to stand it.

SUNDAY IN THE LOCAL CHURCHES

Yesterday was communion Sunday at St. Andrew's Church, and in the morning the edifice was filled by a large congregation. Rev. Dr. Ross took as a subject for his morning sermon "The Vision of the Elders," based on Exodus xxiv, 9: "Then went up Moses and seventy elders and saw the God of Israel."

Dr. Ross drew a striking picture between the condition under which the Israelites learned religion and conditions after the coming of Christ. "The most enlightened of the ancient peoples, even Moses himself," said Dr. Ross, "had never had God presented to them as we have since Christ was on earth. Some people thought because the ancient peoples saw many miracles that they had a better chance to be impressed than people today. This was not true, as Christ, by coming on earth as a man established Himself as He was never established in the minds of the old teachers."

At St. Paul's Cathedral last night Canon Dann preached an excellent sermon on "Neutrality," in which he showed that in the matter of Theism it is impossible to maintain what some people call a neutral attitude. A person must either believe in God or not believe. There is no second choice. People must govern their lives either in the fear of God or else live without Him. Christianity, if anything, is a practical religion and a person who is a Christian must be progressing all the time toward a higher state. If he is not doing this he is going backwards.

In the morning Canon Dann preached at St. John's Church.

The local assembly of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew will meet in Cronyn Hall on Thursday evening, when Mr. Boyes, of Chatham, will deliver an address.

A special appeal for aid for the Canadian mission work was made at Talbot Street Methodist Church yesterday morning by Rev. Mr. Daniel, representing the Baptist missions in the Northwest. Mr. Daniel gave a most interesting account of the conditions under which the work is being carried on in the West, and spoke of the great possibilities.

In the evening Rev. A. J. Vining preached on "The Siege of Jerusalem."

"Missions" was the subject of Rev. H. A. Graham's sermon at Wellington Street Methodist Church yesterday morning, in which he outlined very clearly that what is needed by most people is a sense of their obligations to those peoples who have not the advantages that we have.

In the evening Mr. Graham spoke on "The Fear of the Lord," showing how the careless, willful and neglectful people in the world have great reason for fear unless they repent and live close to God.

The pulpit of the First Congregational Church yesterday was occupied by Rev. D. S. Hamilton, who last evening discussed David's government over the Jews, and stated that many modern governments might profitably follow his methods.

Yesterday was Bible study Sunday at the New St. James' Church, and Rev. Thomas Mitchell yesterday morning gave a most interesting talk on the New Testament, in which he went fully into the manuscripts and different translations in discussing the versions recommended by the revised version as better than the authorized version.

In the evening Mr. Mitchell spoke on the "Passing of Summer."

Special harvest thanksgiving services were celebrated at Christ Church yesterday, and large congregations were present both morning and evening to welcome Rev. R. S. W. Howard, who has just returned from London, England. In the evening Mr. Howard preached from Acts, xii, 10. Mr. Howard showed that we all ought to be deeply grateful for the splendid harvests and many blessings that have been bestowed on us during the year. God has called us to a life of great possibilities. We do not choose our own native land, but God calls us. We should try to follow the calling of God, there being no single soul who has not received a call to higher life.

In speaking of his trip to England, Mr. Howard said that the degradation and poverty of the lower classes, especially in regard to drink, is appalling. The drinking houses are more crowded with women than with men. We ought
