CLOSED CLASSES IN KING ST. SCHOOL

Board of Education Yesterday Decided to Dispense With Two. MISS FORSYTHE RESIGNS Has Been Director of Kindergartens—Public Schools and Collegiate Reports.

At the regular meeting of the board of education held yesterday afternoon No. 1 committee was named a special committee to meet a similar committee from the London Health Association to take up the question of a school nurse. A communication was received from Sheriff Cameron, of the Health Association, notifying the board that Hon. Adam Beck, Dr. Drake and Mr. W. Wright were named a committee to wait on the board, and it was decided to allow No. 1 committee to confer with them. They will get together shortly. Close King Street Classes. In his report to the board, Inspector Edwards recommended that the second and third book classes at King street be closed, and that a kindergarten be opened. Dr. Teasdale pointed out that in the third room particularly, not more than fifteen or eighteen pupils could be found this spring, and it was useless to spend the citizens' money when these pupils could be accommodated in Colborne and Talbot street schools. After some discussion it was decided to ask No. 1 committee to arrange the details of the matter and report to the board. All present were in favor of closing the school. The services of one teacher will be dispensed with. Miss Lillian Forsythe, director of kindergartens, tendered her resignation, and it was accepted. Board Will Settle. On motion of Dr. Wyckoff it was decided to settle with the parents of the children injured at the school some time ago, on the basis of the first offer. It is understood that they are willing to settle on those terms. Inspector Edwards recommended that a second room be opened in the Richmond street school to relieve St. George's school. No. 1 committee will deal with that. According to the report of Inspector Edwards, the total enrollment in the public schools for June was 5,775, an increase of 105 over June, 1932. Of these, 831 were kindergartners. The average attendance in the public schools was 4,245, and the kindergartens 603. The Collegiate. BOYS THROW STONES AT PASSING AUTOS Complaints Have Been Made to the Police of London. A great many complaints have been received from owners of automobiles lately regarding the action of boys in East, South and West London, who take great delight in hurling stones at passing cars. A number of occupants have had very close calls from being hit by stones, and several times the police have been notified. When the stones strike the motor they are dangerous in the painting, which it is impossible to eradicate. "We are going to keep a close watch for boys who throw stones at autos," said Sgt. Birrell to The Advertiser today. "If they are caught they will be severely dealt with by Magistrate Love."
