THOUSANDS OF ACRES FOR THE IDLE RICH!

Rev. Mr. Whiting in Sermon Refers to Land Conditions in England.

"The facts and conditions of this present life call for immortality," declared Rev. Richard Whiting, in the First Methodist Church yesterday morning. "According to Lloyd George there are in England thousands and thousands of acres for the games of the idle rich, and inches and feet for the poor to live on. Today it is quite easy for a girl to dress well if that is her aim, but the girl who desires to lead a pure and unsoiled life, as spotless as the driven snow, may work her fingers off to earn her livelihood. These inequalities and grievances which somewhere back have arisen, cry aloud for redress. Things are not so in this life, the bookkeeping is not completed."

Rev. Mr. Whiting's subject was "Falling Leaves and Endless Life," and he pointed out how both life and nature promise immortality.

In the evening he preached on "The Great Modern Sin," his sermon being a plea against the dissipation of our energies and God's precious time in a multiplicity of unimportant things, small talk and vain amusements.

"No man or woman," said the speaker, "is born into this world who has not a specific task awaiting him or her. We all have a work by divine appointment, though the inequality of distribution is the problem of today, yet there is enough for all. There is a stewardship, a duty for each of us. Find your proper sphere and enter into it."

TROUBLE AT PANAMA

Taft's Assurance That There is No Danger of Annexation Not Accepted.

Colon, Nov. 7. — Despite Minister Arosemena's supposedly assuring conference with President Taft, which resulted in the announcement that the United States had no intention of attempting to gobble up the Panama Canal, the excitement here today, particularly when it is considered in connection with the Government's dismissal of Councilman Carrillo for the utterance of anti-American feeling at public meetings here.

Americans on the isthmus realize that the successful administration of the Panama Canal can never be undertaken unless Washington has absolute control of the entire situation on the isthmus, which amounts to nothing less than the annexation of the territory.

Close observers during the last three years have known of continual conflicts between the United States officials and the officers of the Panama Government. These clashes are of daily occurrence, particularly among the petty officials of both governments. Intelligent Panamanians recognize the serious side of the situation. They say they would rather see Panama completely gobbled up by the Washington Government, than exist under the thumbs of officials of the big northern republic.

Lately, the Panama officials have exerted themselves to dissipate evil prejudices against Americans. The dismissal of Councilman Carrillo is the latest indication of this new attitude. Nervousness and unrest obtain in all circles. The Panama police have been curbed of late and Americans under arrest have re-

population in Colon and Panama has any other city in the world. How Washington will go about the annexation of Panama is suggested in scores of rumors. There is a unanimity, however, in the feeling that sooner or later Washington will be compelled out of self-defence to acquire complete control of the isthmus. REV. MR. CLARKE TO ORANGEMEN

Says the People of Ontario Must Resist the Encroachment of the Quebec French.

A GUY FAWKES SERMON

Large Number of Local Brethren Attended the Annual Service in All Saints' Church on Sunday.

All Saints' Church, East London, was crowded to the doors yesterday afternoon, when Rev. T. B. Clarke, the pastor, conducted a special service for the Orangemen, in commemoration of Guy Fawkes Day. At 3 o'clock the different lodges of the city lined up at the corner of Dundas and Clarence streets, and accompanied by the former Twenty-sixth Regiment Band, marched to the church. The service began at 4 o'clock, and after conducting the devotional exercises, Mr. Clarke read the 8th, 9th and 10th verses of the 8th Chapter of Deuteronomy.

"These verses," he said, "give an accurate description of the land in which we dwell. This land is a gift. It has been handed down to our forefathers, who won it in battle against the Roman French on the Plains of Abraham. 'Victory is almost invariably a sign of divine favor,' he continued, 'and we are only beginning to find out what we have in this country.'"

Mr. Clarke then went on to say that this country must be for all time a land of liberty, that there must be freedom in the worship of God and our methods of worshipping him.

"We must all have equal rights, equal liberties, one language, and one school," he said.

He then extended a hearty welcome to the Orangemen on their visit to All Saints' Church, but reminded them that the name of the church did not imply that it was a place where the saints were worshipped.

Object of the Meeting. "We are gathered here today," said Mr. Clarke, "to remind ourselves of certain historical facts."

He then stated that chief among these was the Gunpowder Plot, the timely discovery of which practically sounded the death knell of the power of Romanism in England.

After relating the condition of affairs that led up to the plot, he told of the landing of William of Orange, with 15,000 men, and his march from the coast to Exeter, where he gathered his officers and men into a chapel and gave thanks to God for their safe journey.

"This is the first Orange church parade," he said.

He then spoke of the imprisonment in the Tower of London of the eight Church of England bishops, and how their subsequent acquittal and release was the occasion for great rejoicing throughout all England.

"The bishops," said Mr. Clarke, "had fought a great battle for the people and had stopped the encroachments of Roman Catholicism upon their liberty."

French in Canada. He next spoke on the conditions of the people then and now, and in dealing with French Roman Catholicism in Canada, he asked: "Can you accept the supremacy of the Bishop of Rome? Can you accept the claim that the Pope is infallible? Do you believe in the immaculate Conception?"

"These people have banded themselves together," he continued, "and determined that they are going to make all Canada Roman, and a French-speaking Dominion. Are you prepared to accept these things? The condition of the people of Italy, Spain, France and Portugal is an example of Romanism, and we all know that Roman England never prospered, while Protestant England is today making one-sixth of the world, has one-fourth of the population of the world, and is exalted of all the people of the earth."

"Compare Romanism with Protestantism, and even Roman sections and Protestant sections of our own cities! Why is it that wherever Rome has gone she has blighted the people? Surely the great God cannot be so mean. We should go round in such a condition. Are you prepared to see Rome dominant here? Ten years ago there were 17,000 Protestants in this city, today there are only 5,000. Why is it?"

"The Roman Catholics have a great syndicate which controls millions of dollars, and every form and house of the Protestants is bought up by them. They are coming up bit by bit into Ontario, and vast stretches of land are already controlled by this syndicate. To keep them from controlling the whole, we must get together as one man. We must deny ourselves in every conceivable way, and above all, we must live righteously."

Good Catholics. Mr. Clarke then stated that with all the errors and superstitions of Romanism it had produced some of the finest and noblest sons of the earth, and that the loyalty, the earnestness, the piety and the obedience of the priests to the higher authority, and their care of the sick and needy, were admirable traits of these people.

"If Protestantism wins the day," he concluded, "we must be better, and show the multitude that we are better than Romanism. We must take this stand not only for our own sake, but for the sake of our children. We must have the snap and aggressiveness of our forefathers if we are to fight this organization. Above all we must stop their political interference and encroachments. That is not connected with the Christian Church, and our first duty is to our God, our King and country. If we perform this duty we shall prove that we are men of the highest degree."

REDMOND RETURNS TO IRELAND IN HURRY

Report of Anti-Irish Coalition the Cause—Predicts Dramatic National Crisis.

New York, Nov. 5.—John E. Redmond, M. P., and Mrs. Redmond sailed today on the Celtic for London, where Mr. Redmond will place himself at the head of his forces as leader of the Irish Nationalist party, "ready for the fray," he expressed it.

Cabled reports say that the Liberal and Conservative parties are considering combined action to check the Irish leader and his party, which now holds the balance of power in the British Parliament. This report caused Mr. Redmond, who has been on a speech-making tour through the Eastern States, to cancel several engagements in New York and Brooklyn, and hurry back to London. He declined before sailing today to discuss the reports of an anti-Irish coalition.

"I am not in a position to comment myself," he said, "I have just finished the most successful American tour I ever had. I have the utmost confidence in the success of the home rule cause. Within the next three weeks or so you may expect news from the other side of the most dramatic kind. If the constitutional conference does not result in the settlement of the powers of the House of Lords, Parliament will come to an instant stop, and we shall at once be in the midst of a national crisis."

Mr. Redmond said that he and the other Irish parliamentary visitors had received during their visit pledges for \$150,000 in aid of the Irish cause, and expected \$50,000 additional. This was twice the amount raised by him on his trip here two years ago.

KILLED HIS DAUGHTERS

Father Then Probably Fatally Injured Himself With Gun.

[Associated Press.] Elizabeth, N. J., Nov. 5.—After killing his two young daughters, E. P. French, a superintendent for the public service corporation, tried to kill himself today at his home here. He is said to be fatally wounded.

French had been ill a long time, and it is believed his mind had become affected. The two little victims were Reba, 12 years old, and Doris, 10 years old. Their father seized a revolver and shot both girls dead, and then turned the weapon on himself. He is being attended at his home here by a physician, but little hope is held out for his recovery.

It was the Italian physician Salvemini who devised a microbalance of such extreme delicacy that it clearly demonstrated the loss of weight by volatilization. Thus the invisible perfume floating off in the air is indirectly weighed. The essential part of the apparatus is a very thin thread of glass, fixed at one end and extended horizontally. The microscopic objects to be weighed are placed upon the glass thread near its free end, and the amount of flexure produced is observed with a microscope magnifying one hundred diameters. A mote weighing one-thirtieth of a milligramme is said perceptibly to bend the thread.

FIVE BILLION POUNDS. Capital Value of Land in the United Kingdom.

Addressing the members at the 75th dinner of the National Liberal Club Political and Economic Circle, London, England, Mr. Emile Hatfield, in the course of a lengthy paper on "The Land Question and the Budget," said that the budget of 1909-10, in the opinion of those who believed that at the bottom of all material social questions lay the land question, had been the greatest step taken by any government in the direction of social reform, at any rate for a very considerable time. The present owners of land managed to raise about £2,000,000,000 (Mr. Chiozza Money's figures) per annum from ground rents. Were the state the real landowner, revenue could be raised from land rents without any taxation. No doubt they were far yet from the time when the state should own all the land; but, until that day came, they should have "social problems." The land must ultimately be taken by the state, and the only question should be: "How can the state resume ownership without doing an injustice to the present owner?" Surely the small proportion which Mr. Lloyd George was taking from the landlords could not be described as a tax, and might also be described as a small share of the rent. Their aim should be to extend the sharing of the rent with the landlords. The taxation of all land on its full capital value would bring a great deal of it into use which had been withheld hitherto to the detriment of the community. It would compel the landlord to seek the aid of labor to enable him to pay the tax. Where labor had access

nor any problem of unemployment, in no other country was the separation of the interests of owner and occupier or cultivator so marked as in the United Kingdom. He ventured to prophesy when they got a complete valuation of the land of the United Kingdom, the total capital value would be found not to be far short of £5,000,000,000. The budget was the beginning of great things; for the purpose of practical taxation, he had only to suggest that it would be better to let all landlords declare what land they owned, with a due notification that any plot of land not returned or declared would, after reasonable notice, be declared state property.
