To Clean Brass Beds.

Please tell me how to remove fly specks from a dull finish brass bed. It is spotted pretty badly,

A .- Peel and wash four or five onions and put them over the fire in cold water. Bring to a boil and keep it up until the onions are soft all through. Drain off the water through a colander, pressing the onions gently to get out all the liquid. Let this get cold. Wring out a bit of fine flannel or linen in it and wipe the bedstead with it. Do not make the cloth too wet. Fine gildings are cleaned in this manner.

Dear Miss Grey. Can you tell me anything that will the white zibeline collar and cuffs of a black coat? I have used French chalk, but it does not clean thoroughly. Besides it seems impossible to keep it from getting over the black cloth.

A .- Protect the black by basting white muslin over the part next the trimmings. Then rub the white with the finest quality of block English magnesia. Blow off the first supply and rub in a second. Leave this on for two days, then brush out the muslin. If Rip away powder. any of the magn has sifted through to the black v be easily removed by sponging with household ammonia
