Cubs' Great Second Sacker Has Been Appointed By Murphy to Manage Chicago National League Club Next Season-Joe Tinker to Dicker With the Reds.

Chicago, Oct. 23.—Johnnie Evers, the Cubs' great second sacker, has been selected by President Murphy to lead the Chicago Nationals in the season of 1913. The thankless task of succeeding to the position of Frank Chance has been assigned to Evers by rumor for some time, but Murphy has insisted on making a mystery of it, and delayed picking the "Peerless Leader's" successor for several weeks after announcing that one would be chosen. The appointment will not be officially announced till Saturday.
