New York, Dec. 29. - A young wohan and a man were found shot to death early today in the rear of a little apartment on the Lower East Side. She was identified as Mrs. Wm. Ashau, wife of a musician. The dead man, who lay beside her, had papers in his pocket, indicating that he was Rogowski, a chair-caner. There were two bullet holes in his head and one in his chest. A bullet through the brain had killed the woman.

The police were at first inclined to put the case down as one of murder and suicide, but subsequently began work on the theory that double mur-der had been committed. Two men were locked up as suspects.



KITCHENER SETTLES

Strong Hand of the Viscount Adjusts Religious Endowments Question.

New York, Dec. 29.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: Viscount Kitchener's strong hand recently achieved another notable success by securing a satisfactory settlement of the vexed question of the religious endowments of Egypt. It has only just become known that this set-tlement was not explained without serious friction with the Khedive, and the presence of a strong British fleet in the Mediterranean, too, may have been a strong influence in inducing the Khedive

to withdraw his opposition,
"On Nov. 6 the Khedive returned from a journey to Cairo, and on the following day Lord Kitchener opened negotiations with him, inviting his consent to a thorough reform of the vaukufs."

Before allowing the question to be referred to the Sultan, however, Lord Kitchener had taken special precautions to insure a favorable reply from his majesty. This arrived within 24 hours, the Khedive instantly concurring, and the affair ended.
