

# ALMOST ENDURABLE IS STRAIN, FOR BOTH SIDES

Officer Likens Antagonists to Two Exhausted Pugilists—Allies Must Break German Line of Communication To Prevent Heavy Winter Campaign.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Sept. 19.—10:28 a.m.—The battle of the Aisne, now in its sixth day, has developed into the supreme conflict of the French campaign.

The latest official news sets forth that there has been a lull in the titanic artillery duel. This is taken to indicate that today's struggle may be marked by a tremendous advance of infantry, such as made the battlefield of the Marne arena of indestructible horror and desolation.

A French officer who has just returned from the battle front is authoritative for the statement that the strain on both sides of the line in France promises soon to get beyond human endurance. He likens the antagonists to two exhausted pugilists, and says that soon they will be unable to inflict further punishment on each other.

Must Cut Communications. The British army, in harrying the invaders, probably prevents the dispatch of any great part of the German army occupying Belgium to reinforce their countrymen in France, but the Belgian forces are not strong enough seriously to interfere with communications, and the allies must break through some part of the line or turn the German right, before they can effectively threaten the communication of the invaders.

Advance Arrested. It is reported that General Rensenkamp has definitely arrested the German advance. The Austrians, in a persistent effort to save the remnants of their army and establish it as a fighting force, have, according to reports received here, been virtually wiped out.

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## MR. LLOYD GEORGE TELLS WHY BRITAIN KEPT OUT IN 1870

Bismarck Respected Treaty Obligations—No Man Stronger for Peace Than Chancellor, But Not to Point of Dishonor.

London, Sept. 19.—(P.M.)—There is no man in this hall who throughout his political life has regarded the prospect of engaging in war with greater repugnance than myself. There is no man either inside or outside this hall who is more convinced than I that we could not have avoided the present war without national dishonor.

This was the text of a speech which David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, made in Queen's Hall, this afternoon to arouse Welsh enthusiasm for Field Marshal Earl Kitchener's new army. The Chancellor went on to say that any nation which disregarded its national honor was doomed, and that Britain was bound by honorable obligation to defend the independence, liberty and integrity of Belgium.

Respected Treaties. Then, referring to the accusation that Great Britain had used the treaty provisions for Belgium neutrality as a cunning cloak for its policy, he said: "Our answer was the action we took in 1870. In that case Prince Bismarck respected treaty obligations, but it was to the interest of Prussia to break her treaty today, as she has done."

Referring to the case of Serbia, the chancellor of the exchequer said that Emperor Nicholas had given Austria the only answer that became a man when he said: "I will tear your ramshackle empire limb from limb" and he is doing it, he added.

Road Hog of Europe. "Prussia," said Mr. Lloyd George, is "the road hog of Europe. Men, women and children and nations are ordered to get out of the way. Even Great Britain is ordered out of the way. If the old British spirit is still left in British hearts the bully will be torn from his seat. They thought we could not beat him. It will be a great war for Germany. It will be a long job. It will be terrible. But in the end we shall march through triumph."

Appealing to Welshmen to join the colors, the chancellor continued: "This struggle is a great war for the emancipation of Europe from the thrall of the military caste, which has thrown its shadow upon two generations in the city. It is a war to plunge the world into a welter of blood."

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# GERMAN INVADERS LEAVE TERMONDE

Also Evacuate Londerzeel—First Freedom Since Removal of Capital to Antwerp.

Antwerp, Sept. 19.—(P.M.)—The town of Termonde (Termonde) and Londerzeel have been evacuated by the Germans. This is the first time that these places have been free of the invaders since the removal of the Belgian capital from Brussels to Antwerp.

The street lights of Antwerp are lighted every evening from 7:30 to 8 o'clock. Londerzeel is a fortified Belgian town in East Flanders, 16 miles east of Ghent. Londerzeel is 11 miles north-west of Brussels.

From many points in the dual monarchy come despatching reports. The naval base on the Adriatic is said to be in revolt, while the people of Vienna, refusing longer to have their attention diverted towards the west, are demanding news of the situation in Galicia, from which district hordes of refugees Poles and wounded Austrian soldiers are pouring into the capital daily. Violent scenes outside the ministry of war at Vienna are reported.

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# FRENCH AEROPLANE SHOWERS ARROWS

Germans Surprised By Steel Missiles Dropped From a Mile Above Them.

Berlin, Sept. 19.—(P.M.)—The German army continues its operations in the district about Suwalki, Russian Poland, according to a statement issued by the general staff tonight.

The army is now advancing on the fortress at Osceuro, 45 kilometers (about 30 miles) southwest of Lyeck (Eastern Prussia) on the railroad between Puck and Pylotok (a town on the borders of Lithuania and Poland). This fortress guards the River Bober, which cannot be crossed, owing to swamps, and forms a natural barrier before the advancing army.

The German headquarters' announcement still give no definite information regarding the position of the battle line in France, contenting themselves with speaking of it generally as located between the Oise and Meuse Rivers, but not mentioning what part of this large region the Germans occupy.

Aviator's Courage. Lieut. Werner von Baezel, one of the best-known German aviators, has been killed. He was mortally wounded while reconnoitering a hostile position on September 4, but clung to the steering wheel until he and his observer had safely landed within the German lines. He then collapsed. As a result of the trip the observer was able to deliver a valuable report.

The well-known sculptor, Friedrich Pflanschmidt, captain of the Fourth Foot Guards, was killed in the battle near Chaumont. The 28th casualty list just published shows 1,056 dead, 4,039 wounded, and 1,023 missing. The total losses as given by all the lists is now 7,453 dead, 23,584 wounded, and 9,000 missing.

Shower of Arrows. A shower of steel arrows, released by French aviators over a mile high in the air, is the most modern terror of war, according to public opinion. The arrows, which are made of pressed steel, from four to six inches long, and a quarter of an inch in diameter, have a heavy, pointed head and a skeletonized shaft. The arrows seem to have caused more surprise than actual damage. Only one man was killed by a head wound in the attack described, the others causing mostly flesh wounds.

The regiment to which the wounded belonged, resting in close battalion formation, paid little attention to two aviators circling a mile overhead until the novel projectiles suddenly rained down, wounding four and killing one. Men were wounded in three companies. The battery in the rear, at first nonplussed, realized the source of the missiles, and many gas words are being uttered by the Germans.

Crown Prince George and Prince Frederick Christian of Saxony have been awarded the Iron Cross.

The whereabouts of pretty Alis Jaffrey, an English domestic, who has been missing from the home of her employer, Elmwood avenue, since Wednesday, when she went to the exhibition, still remain a mystery to the police.

Not the slightest clue is obtainable, except the rumor that she was last seen with a young man connected with one of the side shows on the exhibition. Police have so far given out any statement as to whether there are any grounds for the story, although it is understood an investigation is being carried on.

The girl left the house where she is employed early Wednesday afternoon, merely stating that she was going to the fair. She was unaccompanied, and evidently no one of her acquaintance has seen her since.
