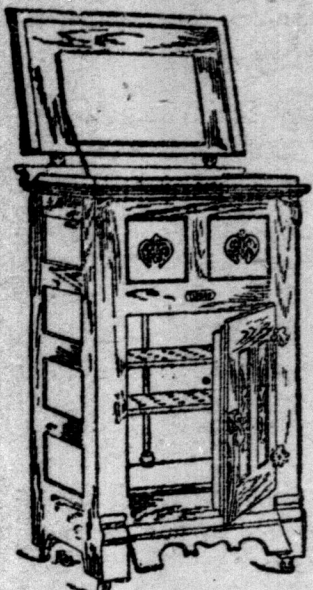

## ROWELL TO FIGHT BARS UNTIL LAST ONE IS WIPED OUT

Leader's Definite Statement—  
The Shops Are Also to Go  
and Majority Will Decide  
Question at Any Time.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

PETERBORO, June 18.—Before an audience of sixteen hundred people here tonight, N. W. Rowell gave effective contradiction to the published statement that if the bar abolition policy did not carry it might be dropped from the platform of the Liberal party. After making an emphatic denial he remarked, "I think I have disposed of that aspect of it."

"But Mr. Hanna is of an inquiring turn of mind," he added. He won't let us inquire into his conduct, he won't face the music when directly charged with allying his department in the Scott act campaigns with the liquor interests and he dare not face the music. (Applause.)

"But he wants to know what I think of this proposition. I will tell you what I think about it. I think it will never be necessary to answer the question, because the people of this Province on the 29th of June are going to wipe the bars out. (Loud Applause), and I think, secondly, that I have been against the bars all my life and I will be against them until the last one disappears from the province of Ontario." (Hear, Hear.) Rowell is backing up the policy of the Churches and helping them to fight the liquor traffic.

Policy As To Shops.

The Liberal Leader followed this up with a statement concerning shops, that cleared up all misunderstandings on this point. He would make local, option county-wide and operative on a majority vote. The shops would be wiped out just as fast as public opinion reached that stage. The Liberal policy was far in advance of the Government on this matter, and yet this cautious criticism was offered to detract attention.

Having made these proposals along with giving the municipal vote to married women owning property, which included the right to vote on local-option by-laws, it did not lie in the mouth of any man to say he had not gone as far as the organized temperance forces had asked him to go.

A Tone Dissenter.

When G. G. S. Lindsey was referring to the support, which the clergymen were giving, Mr. Rowell once enthusiastically dissented in the front row shouted, "Shame." This aroused the audience. Mr. Lindsey retorted by saying that the gentlemen probably preferred having behind him the whiskey interests, rather than the churches. Again this party sought to interrupt, and was held down; and trying again to make himself heard, his voice was lost in the din and he submitted to the inevitable.

Would Close Shops and Bars.

George Gillespie, Liberal candidate in West Peterboro, pledged himself to support any proposal that would include the abolition of shop licenses as well as those for bars.

W. A. Anderson, Liberal candidate in East Peterboro, said, he knew of so many

good Conservatives coming over to Mr. Rowell's support, and so many good Liberals coming back that he felt, on June 29th, Mr. Rowell would have a supporter from East Peterboro.

## THE LIQUOR INTERESTS HATE ROWELL POLICY

Which Is Good Indication That  
It Is Best, Says Arthur  
Hawkes.

WOODSTOCK, June 18.—That Mr. Rowell has not only a large, but an earnest and enthusiastic following in Woodstock was demonstrated tonight at the public meeting held in the Liberal leader's interest in the city hall by the spontaneous applause which followed every mention of his name by the various speakers.

Arthur Hawkes, of Toronto, in a characteristically humorous and forceful address, declared that Mr. Rowell's policy of abolition of the bar came more near than anything else to his ideal of a temperance measure.

"I would not cast any reflection on those who believe that local option is the best thing," he said. "But when we find that the liquor traffic is most anxious that Mr. Rowell should not become Prime Minister of Ontario, it is a pretty fair indication that Mr. Rowell is sponsor for the most advanced temperance policy that has been put forward up to the present time."

Mr. Rowell as a Leader.

"A close observation of Mr. Rowell during three sessions of the Legislature has proved to me that he had led the Liberal party like a gentleman, a statesman and a true Liberal. He has shown character, courage and candor, and, what is especially fine, is that he has had the political courage not to be afraid even of his own party."

"And I believe he will be," he added.
