He could tell of the early days of Port Stanley, when the livery had a hundred horses and a magnificent stage coach, of the time when the first engine for the Great Western Railway was brought by water to Port Stanley, and drawn by twelve yoke of oxen and two teams of horses to London, which was then but a mudhole. He could tell of the time when left two-pound loaves of bread cost six two-pound loaves of bread cost 25 cents; when \$1.25 would buy a hun-dredweight of pork or flour, and when his father got 50 cents for a day's work, and his mother paid a woman 25 cents
