PRESBYTERY THANKS GOD FOR DECISIVE PROHIBITION VICTORY

Receives Applications to Admit English and American Ministers to Canadian Church.

The London Presbytery, at the monthly meeting in the First Presbyterian Church this morning, expressed thanks to God for the decisive victory for total prohibition at the polls on Monday.

Applications from ministers in England and the United States to be admitted into the Presbytery of Canada were received by the moderator. This makes a total of seventeen applications. Rev. W. S. Wright of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, West London, tendered his resignation. In doing so he pointed out that he was compelled to do so if the arrangements of the new co-operation scheme were carried out. William Garrett and P. Cooke appeared on behalf of the congregation of St. Paul's Church, asking that Rev. Mr. Wright be retained. The matter has not yet been decided, and was put into the hands of a committee.

Rev. W. D. McCulloch gave notice that he would tender his resignation at the next meeting of the Presbytery. Rev. P. E. Nichol of the Stratford Presbytery was transferred to the London Presbytery.

Rev. T. A. Symington gave a report with statistics on the Sunday Schools and Young People's Association of the Presbytery. The following resolutions in connection with this report were passed:

"That we adopt on a larger scale the great principle of education and training through service."
"That we give our young people more definite leadership in service."
"That we note with gratification the increased interest of young people in the work of the church and their desire to serve."

Members of the Presbytery were given notice of the Synod of Hamilton and the Synod of St. Andrew's Church, Chatham, on April 25.

Prefers Jail To Handing Over Cash To Wife

Henry Johnston Given Until April 30 To Provide For Wife and Baby.

Henry Johnston was ordered to pay his wife five dollars a week, but told Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in police court this morning that he would go to jail rather than pay it, if his wife would not live with him.

He said that he had offered to take her to his mother's home, but that she refused to bring her baby. The girl says that she will not go to his home because she cannot agree with his mother. Johnston says that his mother-in-law refuses to let him go to her house to see either his wife or the baby. "You can put me in the 'clink' if you like, but I won't pay anything unless my wife comes with me," he said.

Mrs. Johnston said that her husband had not paid a cent to support her in five months. Johnston said that while his wife was in the hospital, she accused him of going with other girls. "Has the baby done anything wrong?" asked the court.

"No, I don't think so," replied the defendant. "Well, don't you think that any decent man would provide for his child?" Johnston was given until April 30 to make the first payment.

He said that he could not furnish a home of his own until he secured a steady job. He was only working a few days every two weeks, he explained.

MIDDLESEX COUNTIES UP FOR TOTAL PROHIBITION

FOR TOTAL PROHIBITION

Temperance Forces Well Pleased At Substantial Total—Delighted Over Vote in Villages and Towns—Suburban Areas Poll the Largest "Wet" Votes.

Although no returns have been received from the Township of Adelaide it was 2,112. A total of 6,974 dry votes were cast in the western section of the county, with the wet forces trailing far behind, with only 1,256. In East Middlesex, 4,414 people marked their ballots. Yes! only 1,938 cast a favorable vote for John Barleycorn.

Villages Go "Dry." Of the several villages in West Middlesex Alisa Craig made the best showing, when ten people voted dry for every one who voted wet. Wardville also made a good showing, when the voting stood six to one. Lucan, the only incorporated village in East Middlesex, voted five to one for the "drys." Ekfrid made the best showing of all the townships heard from, when eight to one voted dry. Canoe, in West Middlesex, voted seven to one. In East Middlesex Nissouri led the way, with an average of six to one. Westminster, with incomplete returns, showed an average of less than three to one.

One "Wet" Subdivision. Not a wet major was shown in town, village or township. As far as it was known, only one subdivision, No. 11, Westminster, showed a victory for the "Wets." This subdivision was a special one formed to accommodate the returns of 121 votes for the wets, compared to 31 against importation. Five ballots were spoiled in this subdivision. In all, 121 votes were cast in any part of the county, and in many villages and townships every ballot was counted.

DEFRAUDS WOMAN OF HUNDRED DOLLARS

James Taylor Will Likely Be Deported to England.

James Taylor, an immigrant who formerly lived in London, England, pleaded guilty in police court this morning to defrauding Mrs. Ethel Jessop of \$100, and may be deported. Chief of Police Robert Birrell will write to the immigration authorities concerning his case. He and his wife arrived at Halifax from Liverpool a year ago and went to the United States. They were detained in a house of correction for two months for failing to pay the poll tax. After they came to London, Taylor borrowed \$100 from Mrs. Jessop, on the strength of a bank book which he showed her and which he had stolen. He had deposited several hundreds of dollars in a New Brunswick bank. He said that he intended to pay her. He gave her a worthless check for the amount.

On his first appearance a week ago he claimed to be mentally unfit, having been discharged from the Imperial army hospital, but he failed to furnish a doctor's certificate. He was found to be sane. The prisoner was remanded for two weeks. At the end of that time disposition will be made of his case.

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TUXIS AND TRAIL RANGERS TO HAVE COMMISSION GOVT.

Election of Mayor and Commissioners Thursday and Friday Evenings.

Important changes in the government of the different groups of Tuxis and Trail Rangers boys will come into effect this week. The old form of government will be discarded and all groups will come under the commission form.

The election for the mayor and the eight commissioners will be held Thursday and Friday evenings, when the C. S. E. athletic tests will be held at the Armouries. Every church under the C. S. E. program can nominate a Tuxis boy for either mayor or commissioner. Ten nominations for commissioners and two for mayor have already been received. Those for mayor are: Allan Kay and Harold Richmond; for commissioners, P. Hockney, N. Andrews, D. Finlayson, J. Johnson, R. Yeo, H. Boylan, W. Young, R. Foot and W. Leamer. H. Adair. More nominations are expected.

Mt. Walker, the present mayor, announced today that all registered Tuxis and Trail Rangers boys will be given a ballot upon their entrance to the athletic tests on Thursday and Friday evenings. They are required to mark their ballot for the mayor and eight commissioners, and will drop it in the ballot box before entering the main floor of the Armouries.

Some new rules have been proposed for the commission government. The two commissioners obtaining the highest vote will hold office for the following year. The mayor will be elected by the council each year. The deputy mayor will be elected by the commissioners. The clerk will be appointed by the mayor and commissioners.

The council will have a right to revise any bylaws of the constitution, and can bring about a change in any affairs of Tuxis or Trail Rangers groups with the sanction of the local boys' work board.
