

NATIONAL AUTO SHOW HAS GALA OPENING IN CITY

Visitors Greet Latest Achievements of Motor World With Real Enthusiasm.

THROUGH CITY ARMORIES

Decorations and Display Hailed As Triumph by Automotive Dealers.

Brief and pertinent speeches from Frank White, M. P., and Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, M. L. A., London's representatives in the federal and provincial legislatures, and real enthusiasm typical of the visitor here, whom a scene of unusual splendor is unfolded, marked the opening of the National Auto Show of Western Ontario in the London Armories at 8:15 Ontario night.

Wilfrid Hodgins, president of the London Automotive Dealers' Association, who presided at the opening ceremonies, in introducing the speakers, declared that the motor car dealers had surprised even themselves, by the achievements they had attained in the way of decorations and display, concluding by expressing the hope that the merchants of London would recognize the commercial value of the show as a civic asset and give it their whole-hearted support.

"We in London need not become pessimistic for without doubt the tide is on the upward trend at the present moment," asserted Dr. Stevenson, the next speaker, lauding the manner in which the government had built roads

Of unrivalled value in the stimulation of industry, averred Dr. Stevenson, was the automobile industry.

Mr. White, the next speaker, said that "The phenomenal development of the motor car is the wonder of modern times."

"Millions are engaged in the business at the present day," he added, later touching upon good roads, London's progress in the automobile manufacturing field and the need of optimism in all spheres of the business world today.

The layout of the exhibition space has been planned in a decidedly striking manner. About the hall and entirely encircling it runs a main aisle from which all cars are equally visible. In the center is a dividing aisle, which breaks the effect of compactness the show would otherwise present.

Decorations Unique.

But the outstanding feature is truly the elaborate decorations. Smlax garlands the walls of the structure in charming effect, symbolizing the advent of spring, the season that the motor car claims as its very own. Then there is the bunting multi-colored, the brilliant pennants and flags of all nations, draped gracefully in skillful combination.

An added touch is achieved in the color scheme by the lighting effects, each subdued or brilliant as the best effect would warrant. Signs hung from roof and balcony lend a more gorgeous note to the whole.

The signs are lettered in gold, each making the display of the separate make of car below it.

On the floor of the armories 67 dealers are to be found. These include both motor car and accessory dealers.

On the 80,000 square feet of floor space occupied there rests the higher priced cars, those that are the acme of opulence, the supreme in luxury, side by side with their lesser brethren whose service is reliability and utility.

One imported car, the highest-priced car in the show, commands a price of \$3,500. From this costly monarch of the road, the prices range in descending order to \$658.

Exhibit 25 Makes.

In all 25 separate makes of cars are exhibited, the majority of which are medium-priced cars of standard build.

Grace and beauty are to be found everywhere in the lines of the 1922 models, the greater ones with a formidable front serene in majesty, the smaller ones perfection in perspective.

It was estimated that the crowd of visitors who thronged the aisles on the opening night numbered approximately 1,500.

Every car and accessory appeared to have its clique of friends, the splendid passenger car display, however, proving to be the real magnet.

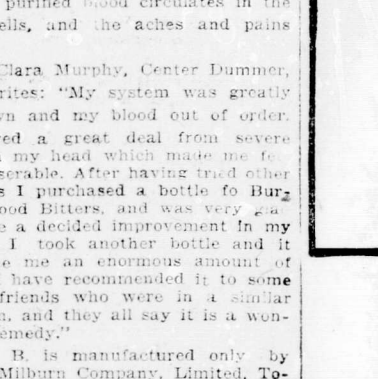

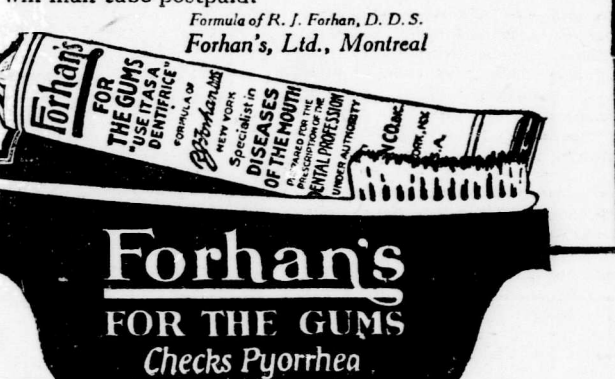
