# SHUT HOSPITAL DOORS RUSSIA TRIES TO UPSET IF HELP NOT COMING WORLD LEAGUE AWARD

Kitchener-Waterloo Institution Tchitcherin Claims Memel Decision Is Contrary To Soviet Rights.

Special Cable to The Advertiser. Moscow, Feb. 23.—Russia is atempting to upset the decision of the League of Nations awarding Memel, the little strip of land between Lithuania and East Prussia, to Lithuania. The award, Georges Tchitcherin, Soviet foreign minister, declared in a note addressed to the allies Friday creates grave dangers to the peace of Eastern Europe. The hope is expressed that negotiations will be reopened with Russian participations.
Tchitcherin points out that Memel is Russia's natural outlet for ex ports, especially timber. The threat is made that if Russia's "rights" are not recognized the allies will be pre-sented with a bill for any damages that may result.

A flat demand is made that Russian merchant ships be allowed free entrance to the port of Memel.
