

FREER EDUCATION URGED BY DALE

University of Toronto Professor Speaks Before Forest City Teachers.

Attacking the trend of modern education toward uniformity and standardization, which tends to produce minds of the same type, Prof. J. A. Dale of the University of Toronto, made a strong plea last night for freedom in education. Prof. Dale was the speaker at the banquet arranged by the London teachers' institute in the Smallman & Ingram dining-room as part of the institute convention.

"What we want to guard against in our educational system is too great perfection," he declared, sounding a warning note against too great systemizing and standardization.

Against Readers.
"For example, I hope the time will come when there won't be any readers in the schools. I am looking for the day when, instead of a single book in the schoolroom, there will be shelves of books, and each child reading a different book. And there won't be this complaint from the intelligent parent, that his child eagerly absorbs the reader on the day he has purchased it, and then must continue to read it throughout the whole year, or else look to other books for pleasure. He will be able to find his pleasure and his work in the same books."

"It is only natural, however, that in a modern democracy which is essentially industrial in character, the educational system should insist on uniformity."

"In this industrial democracy all the tendency has been to crush the light out of the craftsman. There was a great spiritual beauty in the life of the old-fashioned craftsman. His loss has been one of our greatest losses."

Teaching Loses Craftsmanship.
"Is not the same thing true of the teaching profession? Has not the teaching profession lost its craftsmanship? Has it not lost the fact that its business is the recreation of a personality—not merely the filling of a mind with facts?"

"The most precious thing to me about education is in the creation of individualities. And that can only be the result of absolute freedom in education. No teaching is quite so perfect as that of a devoted, skilled mother for her child or that of the rural teacher for her few small pupils."

"It is inevitable, of course, that we must have an orderly arrangement of educational systems, but we should guard against a too perfectly organized educational system which will tend to sacrifice the individual. Systematizing and standardization of education is a violation of its essential freedom."

Enthusiasm in Pupils.
The speaker did not attempt to give any practical advice for the securing of greater freedom in the educational system, but he did urge the members of the teaching profession to remember not only to instruct, but to kindle life and enthusiasm in their pupils—to give them both food and exercise for the mind.

Miss Sarah Lawrence, president of the teachers' association, occupied the chair for the dinner meeting, at the close of which both Inspector V. K. Greer and Bryden Campbell made brief speeches. Over 200 teachers were present at the gathering.
