MAY GO ALONG MEUSE

Joffre Makes Significant Attack at St. Mihiel.

Capture of Quarry at St. Mihiel Is Possibly the First Step in a General Advance Diagonally Into the German Lines Which Will Compel Hasty Retreat — German Staff Alarmed.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—On the western battle front the French official communiqué last night records the capture of a quarry at the crossing of the Meuse, the first progress made in that section of the front for several weeks. It was at this point the Germans took a stand four months ago, and so far they had defied all attempts to dislodge them. It remains to be determined whether the Joffre massed large forces at this point for the operation, whether a general advance will be made up the Meuse, and whether the present progress in Alsace is really a first step to a general advance, stretching like a snake across northern France, so as to give the French room for progress in Belgium.

BANANAS COOKED AND UNCOOKED
