From this unique place of refuge they sent by the hand of a faithful servant, hastily scrawled letters to friends in Manila, Hongkong, Shanghai and Yokohama, including the Chicken of H.M.S. ing one to Capt. Chichester of H.M.S. Immortalite and one to the Admiral. These communications, pointing out the indignities, loss and peril to which they had been subjected by the natives, of course found no difficulty in passing the censorship of the Spaniards, even although they implored the British au-thorities to land troops from the gun-boats at Manila to effect a rescue.

This action was seriously contemplated when the letter just received here was mailed from Shanghai—on November 25. The story told by Mrs. Hodson puts a new complexion upon the distur-bances in the Philippines and makes it clear that the immunity all other for-eigners than Spaniards have hitherto enjoyed is now at an end.
