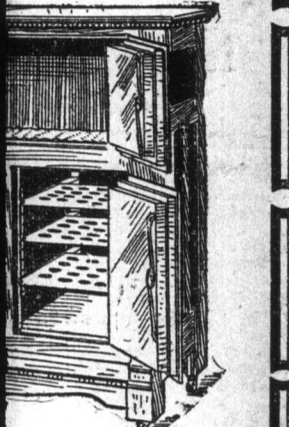

Specification for Repair Work—Tenders Received Until Tuesday
Specifications for the necessary repairs to the steamer Northwestern, damaged as a result of stranding at La Touche, Alaska, have been prepared by Capt. Gibbs, Fowle and Mitchell, who conducted the survey of the steamer. Tenders have been called for the work, and bids are expected to be in by Tuesday. It is expected that, as well as several bidders in Victoria, a number of Puget Sound firms will tender for the work. The company expects to have the repairs completed in sixty days, and tenders have been called on this basis. The steamer's hull is considerably injured. In all there are eighteen holes in it.

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CONTRACT LET FOR THE NEW PRINCESS

Reported That Steamer to Alternate With Princess Victoria is Now Being Built

WHALING COMPANY BRANCHING OUT
Will Establish Barrel and Glue Factories in Connection With New Station at Nanaimo

The contract for the building of the new Princess steamer to run alternating with the Princess Victoria is reported to have been let to a Clyde shipbuilding firm, and the vessel will probably reach Victoria in the summer and be ready for service next summer. Capt. J. W. Group, superintendent of the C. P. R. Steamship company, is now at Ottawa, and the report cannot be verified here, but it is generally believed to be correct. Mr. Richardson, superintendent engineer of the C. P. R. Steamship company, who is stationed at Nanaimo, arrived by the R. M. S. Empress of China on April 29, he looked over the proposed plans for the steamer, and a number of changes were made before he, in company with Arthur Pringle, superintendent of C. P. R. steamers, proceeded to England in connection with the proposed building of two new Empress steamers for Pacific routes and several steamers for the British coast service, of which the new Princess liner was to be one. No report comes from England that Messrs. Piers and Richardson have given the contract for the new Princess liner to a Clyde ship building firm.

THE HAZELTON'S ACCIDENT

Particulars of Mishap to River Steamer at Skeena River Canyon

Further advices regarding the accident to the river steamer Hazelton at Skeena river canyon, B.C., have been received in recent mails from Port Eslington. The steamer had a number of clerks, and her guard room and rudder disabled, as well as minor injuries. She was on her way down the river which was rising rapidly. Mr. Moore, one of the passengers said:

"Before entering the canyon which is the Skeena river, the boat was towing the above, and roasting and setting waters below, the rudder was damaged on what is known as the 'Hazelton' canyon. The boat only draws two feet of water and a heavy wind blowing was at the command of the crew, and the rudder and main masts were knocked out by her stern striking something hard, and she was overturned. The boat was over the other side of the canyon and came the rest of the short way down the river empty dry. The goods box making its unimpeded way through the gap. FLAMINGO SOLD

Canadian Fishing Company Purchases Vessel for Halibut Trade.
The steamer Flamingo, sold by mortgagee's sale at Vancouver, has been purchased by the Canadian Fishing company, of Vancouver, for \$19,500, and since being acquired by her new owners has been fitted by numerous claimants. The Flamingo was bought at Hull, England, over a year ago by a company of Vancouver men, including many fishermen. She was equipped as a trawler on her arrival, and with that rig she was operated on the halibut banks for some months. It was finally decided that trawls were not commercially profitable on this coast, and those on the Flamingo were discarded and hook gear substituted. The steamer continued fishing, but some months ago she was laid up at the New E-station wharf, where she has remained since.

REALTY MEN PROTEST

Agents at New Westminster Protest Against Proposed Tax
New Westminster, June 8.—Considerable discussion has been going on of late among real estate men regarding a resolution passed in the council about two months ago. The resolution was to the effect that in future persons wishing to sub-divide city acreage must undertake to rough grade all intersecting streets before their plans for streets would be approved by the city council, caused a general feeling against the measure at the time. Since then real estate firms have been going into the matter, and have held a couple of meetings at which the obnoxious measure was fully discussed. The upshot of the opposition is that a deputaion consisting of Messrs. Blair, Vidal, Dauphin and Bacchus has been appointed to wait on the civic fathers at the committee meeting of the council this evening, to endeavor to dissuade the council from enforcing the resolution.
