PASSENGER JUMPED FROM THE LIMITED

Soldier on the Ocean Limited Saturday Tries to Get Off at Station not a Stopping Place.

Moncton Times, Saturday:—Passengers on the Ocean Limited express from Montreal yesterday, were rather startled when one of them noticed that a man had apparently fallen from the rear end of the train. The train was about five miles above Rogersville, when one of the passengers happened to glance out of the rear coach, and noticed a man in the snow alongside the track, as though he had just fallen from the train. The porter, in his excitement, in pulling the bell cord gave the signal to go ahead, and the train travelled about two miles before being brought to a standstill. Then the train was backed up, and the man, apparently unharmed was taken on board. He proved to be a soldier who wished to leave the train at Rogersville, and, knowing it was not a regular stopping place, had jumped. When the train neared Rogersville he again jumped, and managed to keep his feet, but he was still a mile from the town, and had to walk in.

COL. LANDRY WILL BE IN COMMAND

Heads 5th Brigade, in Which N. B. Battalion is Incorporated

Official notification comes from Ottawa that Col. Septimus Denison of Montreal and Col. J. P. Landry of Quebec, will each command an infantry brigade in the Second Contingent. Col Denison formerly commanding the 4th Division, has been acting since the war as adjutant-general at the capital. He will command the 4th Infantry Brigade, consisting of the 18th Battalion, London; the 19th and 20th, Toronto; and the 21st Kingston. Col. Landry's 5th Infantry Brigade will include the 24th Battalion (Victoria Rifles), Montreal; the 22nd (French-Canadian Regiment), St. John's, Que.; the 25th Battalion, Halifax; and the 26th, St. John, N. B.

THE WAR LORDS ARE EATING WAR BREAD

To Popularize New War Food Which Consists of Potato Flakes and Rye

(Canadian Press Despatch) Berlin, Jan. 5.—(Via London)—His Majesty Emperor William has given orders that the so-called war bread be served to himself and the members of his entourage. This bread, styled also "K" bread, consists of 85 percent of rye flour, and 15 percent of potato flakes. It is being consumed in accordance with a war time proclamation with the idea of making the supply of food-stuffs in the empire last longer. Up to the present time it has not been bought readily by the general public. It is hoped however, that the decision of the Emperor to eat his bread himself will influence the people to follow his example. The newspapers are giving much attention to the course of His Majesty in connection.

CONDEMNATION OF INVESTMENT COY.

Strong Indictment Against Canadian Home Investment Co., Ordered Wound up

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 5.—Strong condemnation of the scheme of business and management of the Canadian Home Investment Company was made by Chief Justice Hunter, in ordering a winding-up of the company under the provisional liquidatorship of James G. Forrester, manager of the Standard Trust Company. "It is apparent this company is in a hopelessly insolvent condition, and further that it is dishonestly insolvent. A more rotten case was never brought into court. The concern was obviously designed to swindle these people who put their savings into it. There should be a law reaching this class of company. It is a swindle from beginning to end," said the Chief Justice. The reports of the auditors of the Canadian Home Investment Company showed that a total of \$105,000 out of \$140,000 had disappeared because it had been put to wrong uses by the company. Joseph Martin, K. C., said: "The directors had to make a payment of \$25,000 to enable them to do business in the province of Nova Scotia. They had only \$21,500 capital to start with and this had been lost, so they decided to steal the \$25,000 from the contract holders fund. That deposit should have been paid out of capital, with the contract trust holders trust money.—Transcript.

SOWING WEEDS IN SEED GRAIN

In the spring of 1913 officers of the Seed Branch took samples, representing as accurately as possible the average seed used in the districts visited, from over 2000 farmers throughout Canada. 978 samples of oats were analysed at the Ottawa Seed Laboratory and 547 of these, of 56 per cent, contained an average of 76 noxious weed seeds per pound, the highest number being 6,954 per pound. With this weed seed content and the rate of seeding reported an average of 6,400 noxious and 20,800 other sorts of weed seeds would be seeded on each acre of land in oats. Barley and wheat showed similar results. Some of these weed seeds are difficult to clean out, but most of them can be separated by a fanning mill properly equipped and well operated.

PAPER MILL WAS BURNED ON FRIDAY

The New Brunswick Pulp and Paper Company's mill at Millerton, N. B., eight miles from Newcastle, was totally destroyed by fire Friday morning, at a loss estimated at \$150,000. Of the many buildings the chemical plant and a portion of the boiler house alone remain standing. The fire broke out apparently in the office and spread rapidly. The mill was built by James Beveridge, pioneer of the paper-making industry in New Brunswick. The mill had not been running lately, but new machinery was being ordered. It is understood the insurance to the vicinity of \$125,000.

Salisbury Plain, January 1.—The artillery and cavalry units begin billeting at the houses in the village round and about the Plain today, and much relief is felt by all concerned, as the weather conditions continue atrocious. The bad effect on the health of the troops makes the change urgently needed, and it is felt that Ottawa should press the complete adoption of the billeting system. A number of cases of spinal meningitis and influenza resulting are reported by the medical officers.

STOCK SOLD
A report from Chatham states that the J. B. Snowdon Company, Limited, have sold the wintering stock of spruce, cut of spruce for next season. Messrs. H. R. Goodday & Co. Quebec, P.Q., through the agency of Mr. F. E. Neale, Chatham, N. B., report that the quantity of spruce was in the neighborhood of 80,000,000 feet and that was well in advance of 1914.

SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE
A recent despatch from Chatham, N. B., says:—There is every reason to believe that there will be a substantial increase over last season's cut of spruce in New Brunswick this year. The quantity of spruce cut by the Farthington Company will be cut of twenty million feet on the week and it is believed that the amount Lumber Company's cut of spruce will be greater than that of the On the Restigouche, Tobique and Croix the cut will probably be in excess of last year.
