### BRITISH VIEWS ON THE ELECTION

Press Takes Varying Views On the Situation

### HIGH TAXATION AN ISSUE

According To London Gazette; Tribute To Leaders

LONDON, Oct. 30. — (Canadian Press Cable). — "Nine Cabinet ministers of Canada defeated." This is the legend appearing on more than one newspaper contents bill on the streets of London to-night. London has indeed awakened rather tardily to the importance of the Canadian elections. The absence of any clear-cut imperial issue was doubtless responsible for the comparative lack of interest in the earlier stages of the contest, notwithstanding the fact that leading papers for some weeks carried numerous special articles concerning the campaign.

Canadians here all along hesitated to express prophesies. It was felt at this distance, despite the most copious newspaper cables, impossible to prognosticate with any degree of certainty the trend of the election.

Lord Beaverbrook's Standard to-night says that Premier Mackenzie King has recently been subjected to violent and unfair attacks by another London newspaper and that these attacks seem to have been dictated by American influences calculated to give the British public the impression that Premier King possessed anti-imperial proclivities. The Standard declares that this idea is quite erroneous and never had any foundation in fact. Mr. King is a man of the very highest character and of strict integrity, says the paper, which remarks that the same might be said of Mr. Meighen.

HIGHLY FORTUNATE. "The Dominion is highly fortunate at this juncture," says The Standard, "in having as leaders men whose whole lives and actions discourage the baser side of politics. Mr. Meighen has had to suffer some quite unjustifiable detraction in this country. He was the minister in the late Government of Sir Robert Borden who negotiated the agreement whereunder the Grand Trunk Railway was 'taken over'."

The Standard thinks the election may involve the retirement of Hon. P. C. Larkin from the Canadian high commissionership in London, and says this "would be greatly regretted both in London and Ottawa." The paper adds some complimentary references to Hon. Mr. Larkin's work here.

Lord Rothermere's Evening News claims that the retirement of Coty means there will be closer contact between Canada and the mother country than has obtained under the Mackenzie King administration. There may be an increase in the Dominion tariff, with a corresponding increase in the British preference. The News says, and adds: "Canada will protect her own industries first and Great Britain's second."

The Evening News claims that the outcome of the Dominion general election is partly due to the unsatisfactory position of the Canadian National Railways. The paper notes that while the income tax in Canada is regarded by the Canadians as high, it is only about one-fourth that of Great Britain.

DILATORY. There is a feeling abroad, The Evening News says, that Canada has been dilatory in her American policy. So far as tariffs are concerned, there is little to choose between the two main political parties, according to The Evening News. Canada does not like to see the encroachment of American interests in the Dominion, it says, and adds: "Canadian labor probably is the soundest in the empire. It is loyal and is opposed to 'red' influences and it does not exercise such restrictions as exist elsewhere."

The Westminster Gazette says the Conservatives won their seats in the Dominion elections yesterday chiefly at the cost of the Progressive party, which is now one-third its size in the last Parliament. This has caused so definite a swing to the Conservative side that The Gazette wonders what have been the motives of the electors, scattered over such a large area, and says the motives are difficult to understand.

The Gazette says that no doubt the taxation, which is regarded by Canadians as heavy, has had some weight in the result of the vote, but Mr. Meighen's advocacy of high tariffs has had much more effect upon the electors. "Probably, however, the more vague desire to have a change of government," The Gazette adds, has had much influence as any other factor in the result.
