The Late Rev. J. A. Baldwin

In the passing of Rev. J. A. Baldwin there has gone another of those pioneer preachers who have done so much to influence this district. For some months Mr. Baldwin's health had been failing, and a few weeks ago he was taken from Arkona, where he had been making his home with his son, to the home of his daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Lamb, of Pentwater, Mich. From there he was removed to Muskegon for hospital treatment, in the hope that help might be found for a throat trouble. Monday morning Nov. 30th, he entered into rest, at the age of seventy-six years.

The funeral services were conducted in the Arkona Baptist Church, of which he deceased was the honorary pastor, Thursday afternoon, Dec. 3rd. A large congregation gathered to show their regard for Mr. Baldwin, and sympathy for the relatives who mourn their loss. Rev. H. W. Wright, pastor of the church, had charge of the service. Rev. W. M. Walker, M. A., pastor of Watley Road Baptist Church, London, the senior pastor of Middlesex and Lambton Baptist churches, brought sympathetic messages from the Baptist ministers of London; and preached from the text "For me to live is Christ, to die is gain." Rev. T. M. Mead, of Watford, expressed the appreciation of several neighboring Baptist churches, which Mr. Baldwin had served, during the past half century; and referred especially to the Calvary Baptist Church, which was started during Mr. Baldwin's pastorate at Forest. Rev. H. J. Fair, of the Methodist church, and Rev. A. W. Hare, Presbyterian minister, also took part in the service.

Rev. J. A. Baldwin has labored with great acceptance, and marked success in the following Baptist churches of this district, besides pastorates held in other parts of Ontario; Sarnia Township, Forest, Uttoxeter, Calvary, Watford, Wyoming, Alvinston, Brooke, Thelford and Arkona.

Of the family who remain to mourn their loss there are three daughters and two sons, Rev. J. R. Baldwin, pastor of Baptist church Cornwall, Mrs. McDonald, of Toronto; Mrs. Iler, of Detroit; Mrs. Lamb, of Pentwater, and Wm. F. Baldwin, of Arkona, and their respective families.

The pall bearers were Messrs John McLeish, George Stoner, H. Stoner, W. Percy, T. F. Murray and W. J. George, all members of the Arkona Baptist Church.

BY-LAW NO. 6

A By-Law to raise \$5,000 to pay for the construction of a vetrified tile drain in the north part of the Village of Watford.

WHEREAS, it is desirable to construct a vetrified tile drain in the north part of the Village to take the place of the open drain which now passes through part of that portion of the Village and for the purpose of paying for the same and paying expenses incurred in connection with the open drain, it is necessary to raise the sum of Five Thousand Dollars,

AND WHEREAS, for the purposes aforesaid, the Council of the Village of Watford require to raise said sum of Five Thousand Dollars and intend by this By-law to create a debt on the said Corporation of Five Thousand Dollars with interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum by the issue of debentures to the extent of Five Thousand Dollars with coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest.

AND WHEREAS, the said Village have determined to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of said debt to be payable by yearly sums during the period of Twenty years during the currency of said debentures said yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest computed on the unpaid principal at the rate of six per cent. per annum in respect of said debt shall be as nearly as possible equal to the amount so payable in each of the other nineteen years of said period, as shown in the schedule herein-after contained.

AND WHEREAS the whole rateable property of the Village of Watford according to the last revised assessment roll for the said Village is the sum of \$368,816.00.

AND WHEREAS the present existing debt of the said Village of Watford secured by debentures is the sum of \$12,180.62 and no part of the said sum of interest thereon is in arrears.

AND WHEREAS for paying off the said principal sum of Five Thousand Dollars and interest it will be necessary to raise in the twenty years hereinafter mentioned, the following sums:

being the aggregate amount for principal and interest to be paid in each and every year according to the statute in such case made and provided.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Watford, enacts as follows:—

1. That the said work mentioned in the recitals hereto, be undertaken and constructed, and the expenses in connection therewith paid.

2. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality for the purposes aforesaid to borrow the sum of Five Thousand Dollars and to issue the debentures of the Municipality therefor in sums of not less than One Hundred Dollars each, payable in the manner and at the times respectively set forth in the above recitals to this By-law and not exceeding in the aggregate the said sum of \$5,000.00 and the said debentures shall have coupons attached thereto for the payment of interest at the rate aforesaid.

3. The said debentures shall be payable at the Office of the Treasurer of the Village of Watford.

4. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Municipality and he is hereby authorized and instructed to sign and issue the debentures hereby authorized to be issued, and cause the same to be signed by the Treasurer of the said Municipality and the Clerk of the Municipality is hereby authorized and directed to attach the seal of the said Municipality to the debentures.

5. The said debentures shall be payable on the Thirty-first day of December, in each of the Twenty years hereinafter mentioned.

6. There shall be raised and levied in each year by special rate on all of the rateable property in the Municipality, a sum sufficient to discharge the several instalments of principal and interest accruing due on the said debentures as the same become respectively payable according to the provisions of this By-law.

7. The said sum of Five Thousand Dollars shall be expended when raised for the purposes set forth in the recitals hereto.

8. This By-law shall come into force and take effect immediately after the final passing thereof.

9. The votes of the ratepayers of the said Municipality qualified to vote on money by-laws shall be taken on this By-law in the several sub-divisions appointed in said Village for election purposes and the polls will be held and voting shall take place at the same time, and the same places and by the same Deputy Returning Officers as for the Municipal Election of Reeve and Council of the Village of Watford, for the year 1915.

10. The Clerk of the said Village shall on the sixth day of January, A.D. 1915 at the hour of noon in the Council Chamber of the said Village, sum up the number of votes for and against the said By-law and on the twenty-ninth day of December, 1914, at the hour of noon at the place last mentioned, the Reeve of the said Village shall appoint in writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the votes on the said By-law will be taken at the annual election for Reeve and Councillors of the said Village for the year 1915 and that the Clerk of the said Village shall on the sixth day of January, A.D. 1915 at the hour of noon in the Council Chamber in the said Village, sum up the number of votes for and against said By-law and on the twenty-ninth day of December, 1914 at the hour of noon at the place last mentioned, the Reeve of the said Village shall appoint in writing signed by him, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of the By-law and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of the By-law.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that any tenant who desires to vote on said By-law must deliver to the Village Clerk not later than the 10th day before the day appointed to take the votes, a Declaration provided for under sub-section three of 205 of "The Municipal Act."

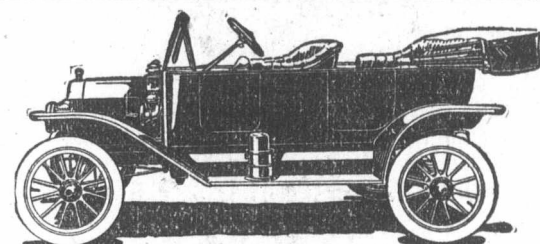
