In another column will be found a report of the Annual Meeting of the Bridgetown Foundry Company, (last week). The shareholders will be much pleased with the gratifying statement of the financial position of the Company. The past year, judging by this report, has been a most successful one, taking all things into consideration. Trade in all circles has been in a very depressed condition, and this fact combined with the difficulties inseparable from getting a new concern firmly established, shows the Foundry Company to be possessed of a more than usually profitable business, and that its affairs are being economically and carefully handled. We congratulate the company, and wish it continued prosperity.

The Mayor's Boy Caught.—We understand that a young and energetic man has been working this case up for some time, and from what we can hear of the evidence he has collected, we are led to the impression that if the case were put into the hands of a skilled detective a great deal of light would be thrown upon the mystery, if it would not be cleared up altogether. One thing is certain, as long as even the remotest possibility remains of a solution of this sad affair, no means should be left untried to accomplish such an end.

Domestic Parliament.—Dominion Parliament was opened on the 25th inst., amid the usual pomp and ceremonial. The Governor General in his speech congratulated the house upon the abundant harvest enjoyed by our people during last year, and upon the great extension of this country. The North-West Insurrection was referred to, and said that in view of the discipline and application of another outbreak, precautionary measures will be adopted to ensure sufficient protection against all disturbances. He congratulated the house upon the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and on the announcement that the road would be open for daily traffic from coast to coast in the month of next. Still the road would increase settlement and trade and give a new impetus to the prosperity of the whole country. Said that in the event of the failure of negotiations now in progress between His Majesty's government and the United States regarding the fisheries treaty, that the house will be asked to make provision for the protection of our fishery fisheries, and the extension of the North-West, and said that a measure for improving the judiciary system in that country measures for the better working of the office of Forest planting and regarding government and parliamentary printing will also be introduced, together with a measure for North-West representation, the better of claims against the crown, postal regulations in British Columbia and the N. W. Territories, patents on Indian lands, the administration of the Dominion, and the establishment of an experimental farm, and an amendment of the Chinese Immigration Act. Referring to the accounts for the past year he said: "The accounts for the past year will be laid before you. You will find that the estimate of receipts has been fully realized, but I regret to say that the estimate of the North-West has added largely to the expenditure of the country. The estimate for the ensuing year will be submitted to you. It will be seen that the requirements of the public service." The address was received by Mr. Everett, of St. John, and seconded by Mr. Ward, of East Durham.

A short time ago notice was made of the new change of time adopted by the International S. S. Co. Ever since the foundation of the Company the first trip of the week from St. John to Boston was made on Mondays. This will readily be seen the traveling public from this vicinity who wish to take the Monday's Steamer, the necessity and expense of stopping over at St. John from twenty-four to thirty-six hours. The management of the I. S. S. Co. fully realizing the patronage that has been given the line since the "Palace Steamers" were built and put upon the route, determined by the new feature of a Tuesday's trip to better facilitate the wants of the traveling public. As yet there has been no departure but they have given sufficient encouragement to warrant the continuation of the service. By the departure a person may leave home from any point on the I. C. R. by and connect the following morning with one of the finest steamers afloat, either the "Cumberland" or the "State of Maine," which arrive in Boston the following forenoon.

March came in like a lion, and a very hungry one at that. On Saturday night a snow storm set in, that continued with but slight intermissions up to late last night. The quantity of snow that fell was uniform, but fortunately as but little wind accompanied the storm, the deposit was light, and it would be difficult to settle the snow, which would result. The cold has been severe. The storm in the Eastern States is reported as terrific. In some localities it is said to be the worst that has occurred within 20 years. Telegraph and telephone lines are paralyzed, and traffic on highways and railways is almost at a standstill. On Monday morning when the express train of the W. & A. R. R. left Halifax, the train was reported that the storm had not then reached Halifax, and that there was no snow on the ground.

A convention of temperance delegates from all portions of Nova Scotia assembled in Halifax, on Tuesday night last, to discuss the position of the liquor question, the matter being in the hands of the Provincial Legislature. The convention urges such amendments to the laws as will practically make the license law prohibitive. George W. Forrest, of Amherst, and R. L. Blank, of River Philip, have been chosen candidates for the House, by the Liberal-Conservative party of Cumberland Co.

At a Liberal-Conservative convention held at Digby, on the 25th inst., Messrs. B. G. Munroe, of Digby, and L. Dugas, of Chatham, were chosen candidates for the local house. Mr. Munroe is a native of Clarence, in this County.

The local legislatures of New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia and the Dominion Parliament are now in session.

Margareville Items.

The day side of Saturday, the 20th inst., is said by those who witnessed it to have been the best day ever known on the Bay of Fundy shores. At Margareville, the water was five feet deep on the end of the wharf (at our correspondent's) was (informally) not over the break of course, so that boats could have floated over with ease.

Stephen Baker, reported in a former issue of the Monitor, as having been severely beaten with an axe in New York, by the mate of the vessel in which Baker was stowed, arrived at his home in Margareville, some time ago. Although he had a serious time in the hospital, and suffered greatly from his wounds, he appears to have entirely recovered. He carries an ugly scar, made by the poll of the axe, on the side of his head, as a souvenir of the encounter, and the precious result of a most sad and painful experience.

The second Annual Convention of the Dalrymple's Association, for this Province commences to-day in Kentville, and will be concluded to-morrow. An interesting meeting is expected.

She was accompanied by her husband and her sister. A large number of relations and friends assembled at the station to pay the last sad rites. The deceased, a very amiable young lady, was a bright and cheerful being. We tender our warm sympathies to the sorrowing family.

A fire occurred in Milton, Queens Co., on the 21st inst., and consumed a large building occupied by J. N. Freeman, as well as a number of other buildings, together with building materials, a carriage and a blacksmith shop, by L. S. Ford. The latter saved all the contents of his shop, but the contents of the carriage and blacksmith shop were all consumed. The whole "concern" was in jeopardy at one moment, and the risk was very great. It is reported that the fire was caused by a defective chimney.
