There was no service at Gordon Memorial Church last Sunday on account of the absence of the pastor, Rev. A. J. McDonald, who was visiting in Guysboro Co. A 3 act drama, entitled "Miss Franchise" will be given at Bellisle Hall on Friday evening, May 1st, by the Granville Ferry Dramatic Club.

An investigation may be had as to the cause of the death of the young son of Edson Knier, of Kennebec, who is said to have died from the results of injuries sustained at the hands of certain of his school mates. In the past six months, says an exchange, Rev. W. H. Warren, of Bridgetown, agent for the Grand Rapids & Nova Scotia, has organized six divisions, visited sixty public schools and addressed over one hundred meetings in the five western counties of the Province.

The Division Lumber Company will add five miles to the main line of their railway at Springdale this year, employing one hundred men on construction work. They also have two hundred and fifty men in the woods clearing the logs being hauled by train to the company's two mills at Bridgetown. The death occurred of H. M.
