BOULANGER'S SUN SETS.

The Senate Court Finds Him Guilty of Embroilment and Conspiracy—The Parisian Populace Accept the Verdict With Strange Nonchalance.

LONDON, August 14.—Whatever the admirers of General Boulanger may have thought yesterday of his chances of making himself dictator of the destinies of France, certainly to-day no one is foolish enough to expect anything of the sort.

PARIS, August 13.—Upon the opening of the Senate court to-day the members of the Right declined to take further part in the proceedings in the case of Gen. Boulanger.

General Boulanger has written a letter stating that he gave the sums which he is accused of embezzling to the chief clerks in the War office to be used for the relief of widows and orphans of soldiers.

PARIS, August 14.—The Senate court found Count Dillon and Henri Rochefort accomplices of General Boulanger in a felonious attempt against the safety of the state.

General Campenon, senator for Neuilles-sur-Saône, argued that the charge of embezzlement made against Boulanger had been proven.

Le Royer, president of the Senate, and Margine, Senator of the department of M-raine, argued that the court was incompetent to try Gen. Boulanger on the charge of misappropriation of the funds and that charge must be referred to a court martial.

The court found Gen. Boulanger guilty on the charge of embezzling public funds and refused to allow that there were extenuating circumstances. The court then sentenced General Boulanger, Count Dillon and Henri Rochefort to be deported to a fortified place.

GENERAL BOULANGER WILL ISSUE ANOTHER PROCLAMATION.

PARIS, August 15.—M. Naquet and Laguerre and other Boulangists have gone to London to consult with General Boulanger regarding a proclamation to be issued shortly. The sentence imposed on General Boulanger, Count Dillon and Henri Rochefort by the Senate court yesterday occasioned no excitement. Thus far the utmost quietness has prevailed.

It is alleged that M. Waddington, French ambassador to England, has been instructed to sound the English Government on the question of extraditing General Boulanger, Count Dillon and Rochefort.

PARIS, August 15.—A huge Bonapartist banquet was given last night at which 1,600 persons were present. Every mention of Boulanger's name was greeted with enthusiasm. General Du Barrail presided. He said General Boulanger alone among Republicans remained faithful to the national tradition of the plebeian. What could be conceived more odious

than the traitorous judiciary trial called a trial by the High Court of the Senate. As an old soldier he felt wounded in his military honor upon seeing an officer and a high dignitary of the Legion of Honor, after serving his country for thirty years, put in the balance against the evidence of swindlers and subject to a trial before such a tribunal.

At the conclusion of the speeches there were cheers and shouts of "Vive Boulanger."

LONDON, August 18.—A manifesto signed by Gen. Boulanger, Count Dillon and Henri Rochefort is published. It calls the action of the Senate Court an act of arbitrary rule, calumny and mendacity, and declares that in spite of fresh coups d'état preparing in the dark, the Signors have obtained confidence in the electorate of France.

PARIS, August 18.—General Boulanger has issued another manifesto addressed to "The Honest People," and declares in it that it was the Senate Chamber that procured his conviction.

M. Constans, minister of the interior, has issued a decree which prohibits the banking and financial documents emanating from Boulanger, Count Dillon or Henri Rochefort.

LONDON, August 18.—Five hundred French residents of London visited General Boulanger in a body to-day and presented him with an address of sympathy and confidence. The general in a speech, said that he had never used money belonging to France except when trying to secure peace against enemies.

Home Secretary Matthews, Mr. Justice Stephen, the Lord Chancellor and medical experts are to-day holding a conference at the Home Office with a view to arriving at a decision in the Maybrick case.
