The Cultural Capitals of Canada program enables communities to invest more in arts and culture, to improve cultural services, and to strengthen connections with other communities through shared cultural experiences. Regina, Kelowna, Owen Sound, Powell River, and Lethbridge (in partnership with Drumheller, Canmore, Crowsnest Pass and Fernie) won the competition to be Canada's Cultural Capitals for 2004.
