reframe his questions, or perhaps take them up when my estimates are before the committee of supply.

Mr. Speaker: Is that agreeable?

Mr. White (Hastings-Peterborough): I was speaking to the parliamentary assistant to the minister (Mr. Mutch), and I will reword the questions.

Mr. Speaker: Dropped.

- 1. By years from 1939 to 1949, how many females in Canada were without work and seeking employment?
- 2. From 1947 to 1950, how many females among displaced persons were employed as domestic servants?
- 3. By census years or other available figures since, and including 1931, what was the relation of female domestic servants to the total population of Canada?

Mr. Cote (Verdun-La Salle):

1. From 1939-1942 no data are available on the number of women unemployed and seeking work in Canada.

From 1943-1945, when most women seeking employment were required to register at national selective service offices, the following numbers were reported as seeking work:
