Non-confidence in Deputy Speaker

We would have been willing to ask the committee on procedure to consider what happened Friday evening, but since a vote is desired, we are ready to vote on the motion.

Does he not realize that the reason some of us would like the hon. member to consider withdrawing his motion is that we do not feel the Deputy Speaker should have votes cast against him for a mistake which was a mistake of the whole house? Does he not feel that it is, therefore, a reasonable request?

Mr. Caouette: It was not our mistake.

Mr. Gregoire: Mr. Speaker, I want to be very specific on this subject. There are some who wish to call this a mistake. Personally, I do not call it a mistake.

We had in this chamber people as conversant with the procedure and the rules of the house as the hon. members for Winnipeg North Centre (Mr. Knowles) and Winnipeg South Centre (Mr. Churchill), as well as the Leader of the Opposition (Mr. Diefenbaker) and the Prime Minister (Mr. Pearson). But, when a mistake succeeds in slipping through all these competent men on procedure, I say there was blinking of the facts somewhere, and that is why I will not call it a mistake. On the contrary, it is indeed a flagrant transgression of the rules that was committed on that evening, and the hon. member for Winnipeg North Centre knows it full well. In fact, as the hon. member for Villeneuve (Mr. Caouette) pointed out, we witnessed on that evening a general agreement to be blind to the infringement of the standing orders of this house.

Mr. Chretien: Blah, blah, blah.

Mr. Gregoire: Mr. Speaker, I hear the argument of the hon. member for St. Maurice-Lafleche (Mr. Chretien) saying blah, [Mr. Gregoire.]

The majority of hon. members or at least blah, blah. It is the most intelligent arguany of them have admitted that a mistake ment put forward by some members opposite an irregularity was committed. Consewho keep barking all the time.

If you want us to withdraw our motion, give us sound arguments.

Mr. Speaker, I will go further and explain the reason why we are asking for a vote. I am quite astonished to find that English speaking Canadians, and I commend them for it, who are always great upholders of procedure and the standing orders have today become sentimentalists, have, in fact, become French Canadians, and do not take the standing orders too seriously.

We feel that our conscience does not permit us to call this a simple error, for it is an obvious violation of the standing orders. That is why we ask for a vote on this motion.
