#### NATIONAL ENVIRONMENT WEEK

The federal Government has dropped the acid rain issue, and the clean-up of toxic waste in the Great Lakes was not even mentioned at the recent Summit, despite promises made by the Prime Minister (Mr. Mulroney).

The Canadian Coalition on Acid Rain has not had its funding renewed. The agreement on South Moresby Island which was supposed to be signed today has not been signed.

A closer reading of the so-called free trade agreement reveals that controls over our environment were bargained away. Even our precious non-renewable resources become goods on the market. Conservation as an objective becomes ever less likely.

Water, too, is a good, according to the agreement, so that once exports begin we will have to continue sharing this valuable resource.

The Government's water policy is not legislated, which it should be, but even that will not provide real protection, for the free trade agreement will take precedence over mere legislation.

The best way for the environment to be celebrated this week would be for the Government to call an election on the issue. Canadians want real action on the environment, not a token Environment Week with government controlled PR.
