

Foreign State, involving even indirectly military obligation shall be finally concluded without the consent of Parliament, and no preparation for co-operation in war between the naval or military staffs and the naval or military staffs of a foreign state shall be lawful without Parliamentary sanction, and this resolution shall be communicated to all States with which we are in diplomatic relations and to the League of Nations.

*Mr. Ward*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, there should be no discrimination against the Canadian National Railways in the carrying of mails.

*Mr. Coote*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, a substantial reduction should be made in the Customs tariff on automobiles and motor trucks.

*Mr. Good*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, the membership on Select Standing Committees should be reduced, so as to secure more regular attendance, and promote efficiency.

*Mr. Spencer*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, Federal legislation should be enacted which will facilitate the incorporation and operation of co-operative societies.

*Mr. Woodsworth*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, if at any time during the first two years after his arrival in Canada any immigrant is unable to obtain employment, the Federal Government should accept full responsibility for his maintenance.

*Mr. Woodsworth*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, measures should be taken to regain for the use of the people the coal mines which are now being exploited in the interest of private corporations rather than for the needs of the public.

*Mr. Garland (Bow River)*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, that in the event of a declaration of war by the Dominion of Canada against any foreign Government or other common enemy, or in the event of a declaration of war by any foreign Government against Canada, the Federal Parliament shall provide for the conscription of every citizen, and of all money, industries and properties of whatever nature necessary to the prosecution thereof, and shall limit profits for the use of such money, industries and properties.

*Mr. Garland (Bow River)*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, the time is opportune for the calling of an International Trade Conference to which all nations shall be invited, for the purpose of considering the elimination so far as possible of trade barriers.

*Miss Macphail*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, a Peace Bureau should be established to foster and promote international goodwill and understanding.

*Miss Macphail*—On Monday next—PROPOSED RESOLUTION—That, in the opinion of this House, it is desirable in the administration of Penitentiaries to provide:—

- (1) Sufficient productive work to keep the inmates employed.
