February 7th, 1933 Professor R. Coupland, Wootton Hill, near Oxford, England. Dear Professor Coupland, Let me thank you for your letter of January 24th. I cabled you this morning, as you suggested, "Nineteenth". Let us decide, then, that you will lecture in Moyse Hall, in the Arts Building, on the evening of Aprill19th, and that your subject will be, "The Irish Controversy". Although Sir Arthur Salter will be here the evening before, I am sure that a lecture by an Oxford professor of history on that subject will get a good hearing. We are, I think, able to assure you that the press reports of your lecture will be subject to your personal revision before being published. The three "English" newspapers in Montreal are in daily touch with the University officials, and I think we can see that the "French" press handle the subject with care also. The fee will be, as arranged, \$75.00, and you will take care of your own travelling expenses. I am sending a copy of this also to Lowell House, Harvard University, Cambridge, Mass.
