ers, and keep those to laying who are giddy and careless of their young. Hens sit 20 days—convenient places should be provided for their laying, as these will be proper for sitting likewise. If the eggs of any sort are put under a hen with some of her own, observe to add her own as many days after the others as there is difference in the length of their sitting—a turkey and duck sit 30 days. Choose large clear eggs to put her upon, and such a number as she can properly cover—ten or twelve are quite enough. When some of the chickens are hatched long before the others, it may be necessary to keep them in a basket of wool till the others come forth. The day after they are hatched, give them some crumbs of white bread, and small grits soaked in milk. As soon as they have gained a little strength, feed them with curd, cheese parings cut small; boiled corn, or any soft food:
