

after which the Society does not undertake
to make any further provision for Mr. Bole,
it being expected that he will then be main-
tained out of local resources.

(3) That in the event of the people of Secunderabad
and West Middlebury not making an adequate
provision for Mr. Bole, at any period during
the five years, whilst his salary from the
Society is diminishing, he shall send to
the Bishop a statement of facts, certified
by the select vestry or other responsible persons,
requesting his Lordship to communicate
in the subject with the Society; and he
shall, at the same time, forward a similar
statement to the Secretary. In this case Mr.
Bole will be at liberty, with the consent
of the Society, to retire from the field of
labour, and it shall be optional both

with the Society & with Mr. Bole, whether he
shall continue in the service of the Society;
but if the Society do not give him further
employment, they will allow him £50 for his
passage to England.

(4) That Mr. Bole shall proceed to Toronto
via Quebec, or, as soon as possible after
the 25th March 1857.

(5) That Mr. Bole's salary for the first year,
namely £150, shall commence from the day
fixed for his embarkation from England, and
that he draw for his & any quarters, by bill
on Messrs. Esdaile & Co. St. James St. London,
his quarters salary being payable, if he so
chooses on his arrival at Quebec, and that
the sum of £50 be allowed him for the expenses
of his voyage to Toronto.

(6) That Mr. Bole will submit himself in
all respects to the joint decision of his Dis-
=cession.
