

after which the Society does not undertake
to give him any further provision for his Master,
it being expected that he will then be main-
tained out of local resources.

(3) That in the event of the people of Liverpool
and West埔ne being not in a position to make adequate
provision for Mr. Baker, at any period during
the five years, whilst his salary from the
Society is diminishing, he shall send to
the Bishop a statement of facts, certified
by the select vestry or other responsible persons,
mentioning his Lordship's desire to communicate
on the subject with the Society; and he
shall, at the same time, forward a similar
statement to the Secretary. In this case the
Master will be at liberty, with the consent
of the Society, to retire from that field of
labour, and it shall be agreed both

with the Society & with the Master, whether he
shall continue in the service of the Society;
but if the Society do not give him further
employment, they will allow him £50 for his
passage to England.

(4) That Mr. Baker shall proceed to Toronto
via Quebec, on, or as soon as possible after
the 25th March 1837.

(5) That Mr. Baker's salary for the first year
namely £150, shall commence from the day
fixed for his embarkation from England; and
that he draw for his passage quarterly, by bills
on Messrs. Egerton & Co. St James's St London,
the Master's salary being payable, if he so
chooses on his arrival at Quebec, and that
the sum of £50 be allowed him for the expenses
of his voyage to Toronto.

(6) That Mr. Baker will submit himself in
all respects to the jurisdiction of his Dis-
cipline.
