SAMUEL'S REPORT CALLED LIBELOUS

Fred Dane Denounces British Minister at Concert to Aid Ulster's Cause.

HALL FILLED TO DOORS

And Hundreds Could Not Gain Admission—Home Rule Cause Battered.

Both the main and west halls were inadequate to hold the crowds thronging to the concert last night at Victoria Hall in aid of the Ulster Unionist fund. After all the seats and standing room had been taken, the ushers had to turn many others away. The seating capacity of the hall was completely overfilled.

The concert was arranged by the Sons and Daughters of Ireland Protestant Association. Bro. Fred Dane was chairman in the main hall. He was loudly cheered for his denunciation of Hon. Mr. Samuel's report to England that Canada was united for home rule. It was a disgrace to a British cabinet member, not to acknowledge the cable sent to him, Mr. Dane asserted, contradicting his statement. It was a libel on the loyal people of Canada.

The loyal men and women of the west hall, said Mr. Dane, had reserved not only for Ulster, but for the Anglo-Saxon race all over the empire, civil and religious liberty. When they fought in the past they had to fight alone. The loyalists of Ulster were an unconquered people, he said. This time they would not have to fight alone, he said, but would have the support of millions of sympathizers from all over the British Empire and every English-speaking community. He had no fear of the outcome of such a contest.

Hon. Thos. Crawford, speaking in the west hall, expressed delight at the large attendance. It proved the loyalty of those present to the principles of religious liberty.

AGREEMENT WILL SOON BE STUDIED

Street Railway Purchase to Be Before City Council in Two Weeks.

Mayor Hocken said yesterday that the amended agreement of purchase for the transportation franchises in the city would be ready for presentation to the city council on March 23.

For several weeks the agreement prepared by Corporation Counsel Geary has been in the hands of counsel for Sir William Mackenzie, and was not considered, owing to the predominance of matters connected with the financing of the work necessary to complete the railway. This work is about finished and Sir William's counsel will be able to study this document.

The agreement submitted to Sir William provides for running rights for radials within the city limits. It will be amended to conform to the instructions of this year's council, that running rights of the radials are not to be included in the agreement, but are to be determined by the Ontario Railway Board after the city is in possession of all the properties and franchises. This will positively assure a clean-up of the franchises.
