There is always some sort of amusement provided on the grounds of the Park. The Chute which plunges into the water is a marvellous wonder, a treat no person should miss; the patronage bestowed upon it by young and old every summer, creates a popularity for a trip to the Park amongst all classes. The Park is an extensive one, covering some 100 acres, with a large lake frontage, and besides a good space cleared for sporting purposes, reaching sufficiently back from the water front to make one feel that he is—when in its well wooded dells—quite out in the bush.
