BIG CROWD TOOK PART IN THE BARN-RAISING

York County Leads Them All Now in Fine Structures—North and West Toronto News.

York County had a surfeit of good things on the go Wednesday, in the Liberal convention at Thornhill, the big garden party at Tommy Shaddock's at Agincourt, the barn raising at Johnny Glendinning's at Amber and the biggest event of all, raising Harry Fisher's big, new barn out in Vaughan Township, back of Thornhill.

The new barn is 40 by 55 feet, popular size and will, when completed, hold an enormous amount of grain and straw. A splendid stone and cement wall about 16 feet in height and giving ample head room and accommodation for a big bunch of cattle 400 horses adds greatly to the solidity and appearance of the structure.

The ladies provided an abundant repast and after everybody had fared sumptuously an abundance still remained. Men like Harry Fisher, who by good cultivation, render the erection of these big modern barns possible, confer a lasting benefit on the country at large. It means a lot of good hard work, but it brings its own reward.

RESIDENTIAL STREETS SERVED BY BURIED WIRES. Hydro-Electric Department Arranges For Underground Service on Cash Payments.

The civic electrical department has handed out its rates and regulations governing street and residence lighting in localities where residents object to an overhead service being given. In such localities ornamental standards, carrying single lights, will be installed and current will be supplied from underground wires.

Not less than one complete block will be placed underground, and all extensions to this original installation must each consist of not less than one complete block. Variation will be made from this rule only where intersecting streets are not thru streets, under which circumstances the lights need be erected only as far as the first intersecting street.

All underground construction consisting of either mains or services and irrespective of whether the construction is located on city property or private property, or both, shall remain the property of the city.

This underground construction will be undertaken at a price of \$2.50 per foot of frontage per side of street. The work is started. Orders to place any who desires to become a customer, for installing an underground service from the street line into his dwelling, when the wires in front of his house have been placed underground in accordance with the regulations of the hydro-electric department.

The charge of \$2.50 per foot of frontage must be paid in cash to the Toronto Electric Commissioners by all the property owners affected before the work is started. Orders to place any street installation underground and complete payments therefor, must be received by the Toronto Electric Commissioners on or before July 15, 1911.

Streets for which no underground work is requested by the property owners before the date mentioned, and streets on which overhead work has already been erected, cannot be dealt with for some time. A proposition covering the changing of these streets from overhead to underground installation will, if the citizens so desire, be made at a later date.

Underground Construction. Last year when the electrical department commenced the erection of overhead lines in residence districts, a large number of requests were received for underground construction. It was impossible to undertake such construction with the funds which had been placed at the disposal of the department, and several suggestions were made covering the undertaking of this work upon the local improvement basis.

The city applied to the local legislature for authority to carry out work of this nature on the local improvement basis. It was found in a great many cases that the citizens were quite ready to bear the additional cost which the underground construction entailed.

The electrical department has designed a number of models of the single pillars to be used in residence work. Some of the requests for underground lighting in residence districts call for the five-light cluster standards, which are used on the down-town streets. These standards, while excellent for main thoroughfares and business districts, would look very much out of place when erected upon a residence street, and the amount of light which they give is far in excess of that required for first-class residential street lighting.

It will be found that the single-light standard placed on both sides of the street and approximately 100 feet apart on each side, will give splendid illumination without detracting from the appearance of the street.

Anna Swindlehorst Remanded. Anna Swindlehorst, the young woman who was with Harvey Kirvan in his motor boat on Wednesday when he was drowned in the bay, was arraigned in police court yesterday morning and was remanded a week upon the charge of vagrancy. The body of the young man has not yet been recovered.
